BATTLESHIP LITTLE DAMAGED Fire on the Kansas of No Conse

quence, and Not at All Suspicious. CAMDEN; N. J., Oct. 7 .- General Man ager Hill, of the New York Shipbuilding Company, today made the following

statement concerning the fire last night on the battleship Kansas, in course of con-struction at the yards: There was positively nothing suspicious about the fire on the Kansas. As a matter of fact, the blazes are not unusual and can hardly be prevented. The fire oc-curred in a lot of sawdust that had been thrown about one of the tanks. This is done after the tanks have been filled with water to test them, the sawdust being used to dry up the surface of the tanks
