

SELLS SLENGOODS Man Floods Second-Hand Stores With New Shoes.

HE REFUSES TO EXPLAIN

Police Believe That Burglars in Other Cities Have Been Shipping Their Plunder to Prisoner to Dispose of Here.

A wholesale system of robbery, with Portland as the distributive point, has been partially unearthed by Detective Hartman, and reason for another dealer in the arrest of a man named Bean, who gave him the police as R. L. Bailey.

Bean was arrested at a second-hand store located at 46 North Third street, just as he finished selling to the dealer 30 pairs of new shoes. To another dealer he sold three pairs, and he had two in his room at the corner of Third and Everett streets, when it was searched.

Bean was arrested at 9 o'clock yesterday morning, and up to a late hour last night he absolutely refused to state where he got the goods, the information he gave the detective being only that he came to Portland from Walla Walla.

Detective Hartman became aware of a few days ago that absolutely new goods in large quantities were being sold to second-hand dealers by some person. He finally ascertained that the man selling the goods was Bean, and that during the past few days he had sold vast quantities of shoes, underwear, handkerchiefs and lace. It was also ascertained that he had sold corsets, and when this became known Detective Hartman became convinced that a wholesale system of robbery was going on in other cities and that the goods were being brought to Portland to be sold.

Bean was watched for some time, and yesterday morning, after he had finished selling the 30 pairs of shoes, Detective Hartman placed him under arrest. He ascertained where the man was rooming and searched the room.

Evidence is in the hands of the detective in the hands of the detective that Bean has sold within the last few days at least twice the amount of goods found in his room yesterday. The detective is very desirous of discovering where the goods have been stolen. Bean absolutely refuses to talk of the matter, his only remark being, "At least I didn't steal them myself."

It is this remark that leads the Police Department to believe that Bean is but a sales agent for a band of burglars operating in the smaller cities of Oregon and Washington. This morning Bean's statement that he came from Walla Walla will be investigated.

DISTRICT WILL BE LOSER.

Ninth Grade in Country School Voted Down—Gresham's Election Near.

GRESHAM, Or., Nov. 1.—(Special)—School district No. 10, two miles east of here, held a special meeting a few days ago for the purpose of considering the establishment of a ninth grade. By a close vote—13 to 24—the proposition was voted down. There are nine pupils in the district who have passed the eighth grade and they will now attend the high school here, drawing their tuition fee from their home district. The loss of such a sum will necessitate a shorter term of school in No. 10, or a decrease in the teachers' salaries. Two teachers are employed and the school holds a high rank.

Councilman James Conley and City Marshal Emery have resigned. Mr. Conley's place has been filled by the appointment of D. C. Ross. Marshal Emery's successor has not been named. The annual city election will be held the first Monday in December, when all the city officers will be elected for a full year; the present officers only holding for the necessary length of time to comply with the requirements of the charter.
