Man Floods Second - Hand Stores With New Shoes.

HE REFUSES TO EXPLAIN

Police Believe That Burglars in Other Cities Have Been Shipping Their Plunder to Prisoner to Dispose of Here.

A wholesale system of robbery, with Portland as the distributive point, has been partially unearthed by Detective Hariman, and resulted yesterday morning in the arrest of a man named Bean, who give his name to the police as R. L. Balley. A simple charge of vagrancy was placed against him in order to give Detective Hartman an opportunity to collect further evidence.

Bean was arrested at a second-hand stee least of North Third street just

store located at 46 North Third street, just ns he finished selling to the dealer 30 pairs of new shoes. To another dealer he sold three pairs, and he had two in he soid three pairs, and he had two in his room at the corner of Third and Ev-erett streets, when it was searched. Bean was arrested at 9 o'clock yesterday mern-ing, and up to a late hour last night had absolutely refused to state where he got absolutely refused to state where he got the goods, the information he gave the detective being only that he came to Portland from Walla Walla,

Detective Haitman became aware a few days ago that absolutely new goods in large quantities were being sold to sec-ond-hand dealors by some person. He large quantities were being sold to sec-ond-hand dealers by some person. He finally ascertained that the man selling the goods was Bean, and that during the past few days he had sold vast quantities of shoes, underwear, handkerchiefs and lace. It was also ascertained that he had sold corsets, and when this became known Detective Hartman became convinced that a wholesale system of robbery was going on in other cities and that the goods were being brought to Portland to

Bean was watched for some time, and yesterday morning, after he had yesterday morning, after he had finished seiling the 30 pairs of shoes, Detective Hartman placed him under arrest. He ascertained where the man was rooming and searched the room. He found in a trunk and a grip the following articles, all absolutely new and in original pack-ages as they are received in stock at stores. Three mire of shoes, marked Three pairs of shoes, marked Richardson Shoe Company, Pactory No. 257 (32 pairs had been sold before the room was searched, all marked with the same mark); four dozen ladies' linen handkerchiefs, marked "Imperial Quality, No. 182"; three dozen handkerchiefs marked "Ladies', Irish Manufacture, No. "Time" two dozen marked "All Pure Lin-en, Made in Ireland, Soft Finish"; one dozen marked "No. 256%, Irish, All Pure Linen"; two dozen suits of men's under wear, combination, manufactured by Montgomery, Ward & Co., Chicago; two two-inch circle saws with teeth one-fourth of an inch; one dozen Dr. Strong's corsets, made in New York; one dozen metal lamps, 12 inches high; one dozen shade rims for these lamps, marked, No. 453, Sun Duplex Illuminating Shade, Atwood Manufacturing Company, Waterbury,

Evidence is in the hands of the detective that Bean has sold within the last few days at least twice the amount of goods found in his room yesterday. The detective is very desirous of discovering where the goods have been stolen. Bean absolutely refuses to talk of the matter. his only remark being, "At least I didn't steal them myself."

It is this remark that leads the Police artment to believe that Bean is but a salesagent for a band of burgiars oper-ating in the smaller cities of Oregon and Washington. This morning Bean's state-ment that he came from Walia Walia will be investigated.

DISTRICT WILL BE LOSER.

Ninth Grade in Country School Voted Down-Gresham's Election Near.

GRESHAM, Or., Nov. 1.-(Special.)-School district No. 10, two miles east of here, held a special meeting a few days ago for the purpose of considering the establishment of a ninth grade. By a close vote-19 to 24-the proposition was voted down. There are nine pupils in the district who have passed the eighth grade and they will now attend the high school here, drawing their tuition fee from their home district. The loss of such a sum will necessitate a shorter term of school in No. 19, or a decrease in the teachers' saiaries. Two teachers are employed and the school holds high rank. Councilman John Conley and City Mar-

shal Emery have resigned. Mr. Conley's place has been filled by the appointment of D. C. Ross. Marshal Emery's succes-sor has not been yet named. The annual city election will be held the first Monday in December, when all the city offi-cers will be elected for a full year, the present officers only holding for the ne-cessenty length of time to comply with the requirements of the charter.
