SALEM. Or., Nov. 8.—(Special.)—The most sanguine hopes of Republican leaders were surpassed in the election today when it is apparent that Roosevelt carried Marion County by 3000 plurality. Only 30 out of 29 precincts have been heard from and these give the Republican ticket 2309 sagainst the Democrat vote of \$28, or a plurality of 2411. This does not include Salem No. 2, where the vote was very heavy, and where at least 300 plurality is expected. South Silverton, East Salem and Monitor are other strong Republican precincts not heard from.

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. &—(Special.)—
Republicans today prevented the Clancys from voting their men in the First Ward. A corps of challengers at every polling place challenged doubtful voters and forced them to sign the registration books. The practical working of this scheme was to drive away doubtful votes and to discourage Democrats from voting. While in the city something over it per cent of the registered vote was cast, in the First Ward the percentage was but 51. The Democrats lost by this scheme.

As a result of a row between Mayor R. A. Ballinger and State Chairman E. B. Palmer, of the Republican Committee, the executive today refused to shift the First Ward policemen and substitute men not in touch with the politicians who controlled the ward. The policemen assigned to duty there, however, worked with the Republican politicians.

Bailinger and Palmer fell out over Palmer's declaration at a conference of party leaders that Chief of Police Delaney is a jobber. The Mayor has been an intimate friend of Delaney for years, and resented the imputation.

A big early vote was cast today in all the city precincts, and the fear that a congestion at the closing hours would prevent many from voting proved unfounded: Remarkably fine weather prevailed all over Western Washington to-day.

Machines Give Good Satisfaction.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 8.—The vote in this city as well as in the state is very heavy and in the precincts not supplied with voting machines the returns are slow in coming in. Forty machines are in use in this city and have given good satisfaction, thought in sureral cases trouble was experienced in their operation, owing to the inexperience of the votera. The lever of one machine was accidentally broken but it was soon repaired.

Ex-Mayor Phelan, M. H. DeYoung, Fairfax Whelan, and the other prominent citizens who were appointed election officers by the election commissioners, were at their posts when the polls opened and stuck to their duties all day long. Several election officers were removed from their places when it was learned that they resided in other districts, and substitutes appointed. It was evident from the time occupied that most voters in marking their tickets, that many of them have been acratched. No trouble has been reported and the election has been one of the most quiet ever known here.
