The matter will be considered at the meeting of the State Commission tomorrow afternoon. As other states are beginning to send their applications to Director of Exhibits Henry E. Dosch, awards must be tasde at this time, and without any partiality being shown. As with the manufacturers, it is a case of first come first served, and since no favoritism can be shown. Oregon must stand on its own merits. As the Exposition means more, perhaps, to Oregon than to any other state, the necessity of the best possible exhibits in all departments is obvious.
