This proposition was heartly received by quite a number, who are now preparing their soil, and in the Spring the seed will be furnished. The results of this experiment will be watched with a great deal of interest, for if successful it will revolutionize the dairy industry of the Valley, where feed is now so costly as to be almost impossible to obtain and make both ends need. 
