## Roosevelt Receives Japanese Prince.

## MIKADO SENDS GREETINGS

## Desire for Closer Relations With America Expressed.

## PRESIDENT'S REPLY GRATIFIES

## He Assures His Visitor That His Sentiments Are Reciprocated by the Nation at Large—Dinner Concludes the Programme.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—Prince Sadamura Fushima, a near relative of the Emperor of Japan, who has arrived in Washington as the guest of the Nation, called today at the White House and conveyed to the President the good wishes and friendship of the Mikado, and the latter's hope for the President's continued good health and happiness. The Prince's address, which was in Japanese and interpreted by one of his suite, was brief and bespoke closer and stronger relations between the two countries. The President

In his response gave assurance of this sentiment by the American people and wished the Japanese people prosperity. Shortly before 10 o'clock, Prince Fushima and his suite were driven from the Arlington Hotel to the White House. The Prince occupied the state carriage of the Japanese Legation. Assistant Secretary Peirce and Mr. Hoki rode with him. The suite consisted of A. Sato, grand master of the Prince's household; Count S. Terashima, Major Mihara, Mr. Watanabe, master of ceremonies of the Emperor; Dr. K. Bokku, physician to the Prince, and Mr. Shosuka Matsuka, third secretary of the Japanese Legation, who met the Prince at San Francisco. Prince Fushima was attired in the uniform of a Lieutenant-General of the Japanese army. The other members of his suite wore uniforms of their grades in the army or the diplomatic corps. As the carriages of the party, headed by a platoon of mounted police, swept into the porte cochere of the White House, they were met by Colonel Charles S. Brown, the military aide, and Captain Cameron McR. Winslow, the naval aide of President Roosevelt. Assistant Secretary Peirce presented the Prince to them, and the party then was conducted into the White House. Meeting With Roosevelt. The Prince and his suite were ushered into the blue room, where in a few minutes President Roosevelt, accompanied by Assistant Secretary of State Francis B. Loomis and Secretary Loeb, greeted them. The greeting between the President and Prince Fushima was cordial. The presentations were made by Mr. Peirce. Prince Fushima addressed the President in Japanese, his remarks being interpreted by one of his suite. He said in part: "His Majesty, the Emperor of Japan, charged me to convey to you his earnest desire that the historic relations of amity and good feeling which have always, since the days of Commodore Perry, united the great republic of the West with the empire of the legendary East, and which have contributed in no small measure to the progress and prosperity of Japan, may grow still closer and stronger with the passing of years, and I assure you, Mr.

President, that I believe I interpret the sentiment of my countrymen when I add that the words of His Majesty find a ready echo in the hearts of His Majesty's loyal subjects."

The President's response was as follows: "It gives me unfeigned pleasure to meet your Imperial highness, and to hear from you the expression of the friendly sentiments of His Majesty, the Emperor, and of the people of Japan toward the United States. I assure you that these sentiments are reciprocated by me and by the American people. Ever since the Empire of Japan, at the invitation of this country, entered upon the career of modern and international progress, which has led to such brilliant results, the relations of the two countries have been those of unbroken friendship. I pray that those relations may continue forever, growing always more friendly and more extended, and I trust that this visit of your Imperial highness may result in that increase of mutual good will between this Republic and the Empire of Japan which will naturally come from more intimate acquaintance and wider knowledge of each other. "I beg you to convey to His Majesty, the Emperor, my grateful appreciation of his valued expressions of amity and my best wishes for his health and happiness and the prosperity of the Japanese people."

The President and Prince Fushima then chatted amiably for ten minutes. Their conversation was conducted through an interpreter and related principally to Japanese history and literature, with incidental reference to the Russo-Japanese war, in which Prince Fushima has played a conspicuous part. The Prince expressed himself as pleased and surprised at the knowledge the President showed of these subjects.

**President Returns Call.**  
The Prince and his party left the White House under the escort of Mr. Peirce and Colonel Symons. The President later returned the call of Prince Fushima, driving from the White House to the Arlington Hotel in an open carriage, surrounded by bicycle policemen. Accompanying the President were his secretary, Mr. Loeb, and his military and naval aides. After the President left, the Prince took an automobile ride over the city, escorted by Colonel Symons and Mr. Peirce. At the White House tonight the Prince was the guest of honor at a dinner given by the President. No women were present.

**TURN TO CABLE WHEN WIRES GO**  
Chicago Brokers Send Messages to New York by Way of Yokohama.

CHICAGO, Nov. 15.—Cut off from the East by the storm's destruction of telegraph and telephone wires, Chicago brokers have resorted to extraordinary expedients in their efforts to establish business with their New York offices. Messages were sent around the world by way of Yokohama, but no replies were received in time to be of value for the day's trading. In other instances messages were dispatched to New York on the 30-hour flyer, which leaves Chicago just afternoon, the hope being that the fast train would be able to reach the metropolis before the opening of the Stock Exchange today. Still another expedient was to telegraph orders to Rochester or Buffalo, to which cities wires were in operation, and from which the orders were mailed to New York City. It was the most complete tie-up of wire service that the Stock Exchange has known in the last 15 years. There was no time during the day when any broker knew the condition of the New York

market at the moment, quotations being so far behind as to be valueless.

**New York Far From Normal.**  
NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—While considerable progress has been made in repairing the damage wrought by Sunday night's gale, conditions today are by no means normal. Good connections had been established between New York, Philadelphia and Boston, but beyond these points emergency connections were still in use. In Eastern Maine, where more than 1200 telegraph and telephone poles were blown down during the storm, the wires were still out of service.
