

QUAKERS EASILY WIN

Cornell Eleven Is Defeated by Score of 34 to 0.

ROUGH PLAYING A FEATURE

In Nearly Every Scrimmage When the Ithaca Boys Have the Ball One of Them is Laid Out—Attendance is Large.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 24.—The University of Pennsylvania football eleven closed its season by defeating the Cornell eleven, 34 to 0. Pennsylvania scored four touchdowns in the first and two in the second half. Had it not been for penalties inflicted on the Red and Blue, Cornell would never have been within striking distance of the Pennsylvania goal.
