Heavy Gale at the Mouth of the River Delays Shipping and Damages Jetty A heavy southwester was piping around the bar again yesterday, and at a late hour last evening, the big steamship Elleric, which is slightly overdue from the Orient, had not put in an ap-pearance. The steamer Francis H. Leg-gett with a cargo. of wheat and lum-ber, crossed out in the afternoon and the steamer Acme from San Francisco came in earlier. The steamers F. H. Kilburn and Alliance arrived down at Astoria, but the skippers apparently preferred to wait until the storm let up before venturing outside. The observer at North Head reported that the big storm Saturday evening had car-ried out some more of the jetty, but the extent of the damage is not known. No uneasinese is felt for the Elleric on account of her long passage, but she has undoubtedly felt the force of the gales which have been sweeping over the Pacific for the past fortnight.
