Raised Railroad Rates Shuts Them

Out of Eastern Markets.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Nov. 28 .- The Her-

LOS ANGELLES, Cal., Nov. 28.-The Her-ald today says: After seeking for the past three years to come to some understanding with the Southeastern lines in regard to an adjust-ment of freight rates, the Transconti-nental Freight Bureau lines have deter-mined upon a final move, and today will notify shippers throughout California that, beginning with December 17, they will cancel all rates now in effect in con-nection with Southeastern roads for traf-fle to, from or passing through Pacifie nection with Southeastern roads for traf-fic to, from or passing through Pacific Coast terminals on one hand and to, from or passing through points east of the Mis-sissippi. Exceptions to this ruling are the lines of the Himois Central, the Mobile & Ohio and the Kamass City, Memphis & Birmingham railroads. The effect of the decision, by which citrus growers are practically excluded from the sale of their fruits in six of the Eastern states, will be severciy felt in other lines of business. It means that, with the exception noted, fruitgrowers, in addition to paying through rate, will be

addition to paying through rate, will be forced to pay the local rate that is in effect east of the Mississippi River, and if the fruit finds no market in the city to which it is consigned, the shippers must neither let it rot or pay an additional local make to any other city to which it is consigned. The states in the East af-fected by this ruling are Kentucky. Tenrested by cms ruling are kentucky, ren-nessee, Virginia and Mis-assippi. Along with the hardships meted out to the cirrus growers come the same conditions for shippers of canned goods, dried fruits and wines from this section dried fruits and wines from this section of the country, and in return a raise in groots, tobacco, furniture and other staples which are received in large quan-titles from the states in question. 
