Fourteen Vessels Sailed in November for California Ports.

Fourteen vossels lumber-laden cleared from Portland in November for California ports, carrying 5,063,892 feet, and two for-eign shipments were made, aggregating 1,123,660 feet. The schooner Honolulu took 1,100,000 feet to Shanghal, and the remainder formed part of the cargo of the Nico-media for Hong Kong. Of the coastwise cargoes sent out, that on the Robert Scarles went to Point Richmond and the remainder were about equally divided between San Francisco and San Pedro. 
