The nature of the indictments is a legal puzzle at the present time, which it is said the grand jury is endeavoring to

Indictments can be brought if a conspirney to defraud can be established; brib-ery is a crime which can be severely pun-ished. If proof is forthcoming of any false certificate or certificates, an indict-ment for obtaining money under false pretenses would lie.

Evidence merely showing that the work was not done according to contract, at-torneys say, would hardly support a criminal charge, it would open the door for a civil action to prevent the contractor from collecting his bill, or warrant the in refusing to accept the work and

If so, a number of indictments of the same kind will probably turn up soon with the proper names of the persons implicated attached, and sensation caused by the disclosure will not be a small one.
