

#### Interesting Story of St. Boniface and the First Yuletide Told at Library.

The story of the first Christmas tree, which was set up in Germany hundreds of years ago, when the Kaiser's country was not the peaceful land of happy homes that it is today, was told yesterday at the Library by Miss Hassler.
