Screaming with pain he rushed into an adjoining room, where his uncle, George A. Weitman, was resting, and who had the rare presence of mind to smother the flames by means of a

It was at first thought that the injuries might be fatal, but an examination showed only the ears and right wrist to be severely burned. While still suffering pain the condition of the boy is not regarded as precarious, and the doctors say that he will recover.
