Monster Iron Statue for Portland Fair.

## ALABAMA TO SEND EXHIBIT

Famous Statue Cast From Metal Will Have Place Near Mining Building-Arrangements for New Fine Arts Palace.

The measter iron statue of Vulcan, from the model by G. Moretti, the well-known sculptor, is to be brought to Portland and displayed at the Lewis and Clark Ex-

Word has been received at Exposition headquarters that the Commercial Club of Birmingham, Ala., is devising means to send the statue here. Mayor F. Y. Anderson is chairman of the committee having the details in charge. Joseph B. Babb, secretary of the Birmingham Commercial Club, writes Secretary Reed that it is quite certain that the Vulcan will be sent to Portland within a few weeks.

The Vulcan -as cast in iron from Moretti's model, and all of the metal used in its construction, as well as the minerals composing the foundations, are from Alabama mines. The exhibit was completed at a cost of \$20,000, and it took a year to do the work. The Vulcan tips the scales at 100,000 pounds, and stands 57 feet high. The statue is a very imposing one, great in scope and beld in execution.

Will Occupy Prominent Place.

At the St. Louis Fair the Vulcan was or exhibition inside a building, where its imposing grandeur was lost in the mass of arrounding exhibits. Its head was near the ceiling, too near for a good view to be obtained. To be appreciated the Vulcan taken in, and this was impossible at St.

At the Lewis and Clark Exposition, however, the Vulcan will be seen to better advantage. The statue will have a prominent place on the grounds, perhaps near entrance to the Mines and Metallurgy all its rough glory, in such a position that it can easily be observed to advantage.
