It is that the communicator is himself in an abnormal mental condition while communicating. It may be compared to a delirious dream, or to certain types of secondary personality in the living, or even to the trance of Mrs. Piper, in some of its aspects. The only question for the scientific man to raise is whether there is any evidence for such an hypothesis.
