tion TM has held that "this section does not apply to criminal sections, as the criminal code is complete in that respect."

The Supreme Court has also held that neither the husband nor wife can be examined for or against the other during marriage, or afterward, without the other's consent; sho that where a husband has jestified in a case, his wife is a competent witness on that whiter without petent witness on that subject without his express consent.
