Indemnity for Murder of Missionary.

FANATICS SLEW AMERICAN

Descendant of Prophet Gets Off With Blood Money.

OTHERS ARE TO BE PUNISHED

Persian Government, After Long Delay, Gives Sum Largely in Excess of Amount Named, Under Pressure From President.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—Information has reached the State Department that, complying with the insistent demands of the United States, the Persian government has made to the widow partial reparation for the murder of the Rev. Benjamin W. Laharree, an American missionary, by a gang of fanatics, and has promised that all the guilty persons involved in the crime will be punished. The following statement regarding the case was made by an official of the State Department:

"March 15 last the Department of State received the telegraphic intelligence of the murder of Rev. B. W. Laharree, an American missionary, near Ouzoum, in Persia, by a gang of fanatic Kurds. A demand was immediately made for the arrest and trial of the murderers, whose leader, Seyd Mir Ghafar, was looked upon as a lineal descendant of the Prophet. This circumstance and the fear of arousing religious disturbances obviously interfered with the prompt and efficient action on the part of the local authorities. The most pressing and earnest representations of the American Legation at Teheran remained fruitless until October 12, when Mr. Ray instructed its Minister by cable to make known to the government of the Shah the President's concern in the adequate punishment of all the criminals and his intention to lay the matter before Congress with appropriate recommendations, with his demands for full justice, were further delayed.

"The murderers were thereupon arrested, but the Persian government, holding the life of a descendant of the Prophet sacred, offered a pecuniary indemnity in lieu of the death penalty for Seyd Mir Ghafar and promised execution of the accomplices. After consultation with the widow of Rev. Mr. Laharree the offer was accepted and an indemnity of \$20,000—greatly in excess of the sum named by the widow—was paid to the American Legation. The Sultan of Morocco, Abdul Aziz, is believed to be completely in the hands of the French, which means that there is an outbreak of hostilities, it will be in the nature of a civil war, as such as an attack against the Europeans. The Sultan has left the Muslim faith for Christianity, and is endeavoring to cause the troops loyal to him to desert in the name of the prophet, Ralsuil is making a great deal of noise about religious animosity towards the Sultan, and he is secretly pushing the claims of the pretender Muley Mohammed, on the understanding that if the pretender gains the throne he will make Ralsuil his prime minister.

"There is no fear of any more trouble in Morocco leading to a dangerous diplomatic situation in Europe. The predominant nature of French interests in Morocco is recognized in all the Continental capitals, except Madrid, and the Spaniards are impotent to hold France in check. The authorities at Paris believe themselves compelled to act.

**Beatification of Venerable Priest.**  
ROME, Jan. 8.—The beatification of the venerable vian, parish priest of Ars, France, was celebrated today in St. Peter's in the presence of 3,000 French pilgrims and several thousands of worshippers of other nationalities, and in the presence of Pope X. II. Cardinals and the papal court. The ceremony was rendered otherwise notable by the attendance of the Duke of Genoa, brother of Dowager Queen Margherita; the Duchess of Genoa and her son, Prince Ubaldo, who were recognized by the private chamberlain to the pope, and Francis McNutt, of Washington, D. C., and conducted to special seats. They knelt in the passage while the pope made his benediction.

"This is the first time that members of the House of Savoy have assisted at a religious function in the presence of the pope.

**To Improve British Naval Gunnery.**  
LONDON, Jan. 8.—With a view of improving the naval gunnery the Admiralty has decided to create the new post of director of naval gunnery, to which Captain Percy Scott will be appointed. Captain Scott is a great expert in his line, and during his period of command of the cruisers Scylla and Terrible these vessels lost much of all other British men-of-war in gunnery.

**Turkia's Town Placed Under Arrest.**  
URKUB, European Turkey, Jan. 8.—On December 23, by order of Hilma Pasha, the whole municipality of Iskub, with the vicar and clergy of the vicarage, were arrested, the accusation being that they have formed a revolutionary tribunal. A search of the homes of the accused was without result, but all efforts to secure their liberation have been unsuccessful.

**Serafini Will Return to Rome.**  
MEXICO CITY, Jan. 8.—Apostolic Delegate Serafini has resigned his post and will leave for Rome next week. Monsignor Serafini has suffered from the effects of the altitude.

**To Succeed Milner.**  
LIVERPOOL, Jan. 8.—The Post bears on good authority that J. W. Lowther, M. P., will succeed Milner as Commissioner to South Africa in April.

**MARKET DID NOT FEEL IT.**  
Fall of Port Arthur Had No Effect on London Stocks.

LONDON, Jan. 8.—The fall of Port Arthur had comparatively small effect on the Stock Exchange. Russians and home stocks not suffering to any great extent, the market generally remained firm. In France a feeling of nervousness about the internal situation in Russia is beginning to be observed, which has had the effect of weakening the markets the last two days. Business in all directions is expected to be rather restricted owing to the international situation following the capitulation of Port Arthur becoming better defined. The market was unsettled by the prospect of continued Northern Securities litigation. Prices were rather weaker.

**KING'S UNCLE AT ST. PETER'S**  
Good Understanding May Obtain Between Quirinal and Vatican.

ROME, Jan. 8.—Duke Tomaso Alberto Victor, of Genoa, the King's uncle, and his consort attended the services at St. Peter's yesterday, with their entire suite. Pope Pius was present in the cathedral and remained throughout.

Every newspaper today takes note of these facts, and the unanimous opinion prevails that in this manner the first step has been taken for a rapprochement between the Vatican and the Quirinal. This was the first time in many years that a member of the royal family attended the services at St. Peter's in public, and the exchange of diplomatic assurances of mutual regard between the pope and the King is confidently looked for.

TALK ON NEW STATES

Senator Morgan Will Open the Discussion Today.

HITCH IS OVER NEW MEXICO

If Plan to Unite That Territory With Arizona is Abandoned, Consolidation of Oklahoma and Indian Nation May Be Effected.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—The joint statehood bill will continue to be the principal topic of discussion in the Senate during the present week, but other measures will receive attention each day during the morning hour, including the omnibus claims bill for which Senator Warren stands sponsor. The bill comprises more than 200 pages, but the Senator already has succeeded in having it read by utilizing the omnibus claims bill for a large and important part of the work of consideration to the rear.

An effort will be made to get through the bill providing for the compensation of American fishermen in the waters of Alaska. This measure is in the hands of Senator Fulton, who will press it in an act of justice to men who have been discriminated against.

The pure food bill will remain in the background for the present, not because the friends of that measure have abandoned it, but because they are not pressing for immediate consideration. They have been assured by the Republican leaders that the bill will first be taken up after the statehood bill is disposed of and therefore they will not antagonize the statehood bill for the present if at all.

Discussion of the statehood question will begin on Monday with a speech by Senator Morgan, and he will be followed by other opposing Senators. The present position is that the bill is to be kept by the discussion going until some of the appropriation bills are reported and it becomes necessary to take them up; or, if this is postponed too long, to displace the bill with the pure food bill. Falling in all these expedients, they probably will seek a compromise.

The only real fight is against the uniting of Arizona and New Mexico, and there is talk of eliminating these territories entirely from the statehood proposal. It is believed if this were done the bill for the consolidation of Oklahoma and Indian Territory would pass. Thus far there has been no conference of opposing factions on the subject and probably little will be done to change the present status, so long as the Senate is anxious to keep other matters in the background, as appears to be the case at present.

**Appropriating Bills This Week.**  
WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—It is the intention of the House to begin active consideration of appropriation bills during the week, Monday is District of Columbia day, and the resolution providing for the ceremonies of the inauguration of President Roosevelt will be decided where the inauguration bill shall be held will be considered. Another measure of more than local importance to be called up is a bill granting the American Railway Appliance Exposition authority to use the monument grounds for an exhibition.

It is expected the resolutions introduced by Representative Baker will be disposed of. They were referred to the judiciary committee and no doubt will be reported back Monday for action by the House. These are the resolutions of President Roosevelt and Secretary Morton.

The pension appropriation bill will be reported tomorrow and possibly taken up for consideration Tuesday. It will be for the benefit of the Indian and the District of Columbia appropriation bills. While they may not all be considered during the week, they will be ready for action.

The bill which remains the unfinished business, and Friday will be devoted to pension bills.

**PROTEST FROM ARIZONA.**  
Congress Asked to Leave Question of Merger to Vote of People.

TUCSON, Ariz., Jan. 8.—At a meeting of the Society of Arizona Pioneers this afternoon an earnest protest against the merger of Arizona and New Mexico jointly into a state was adopted. In substance it follows:

"We declare that pledge of the Federal Government in the enactment of the organic law creating Arizona into a territorial government and defining the geographical boundaries, in which it was agreed Arizona should enjoy territorial rights of citizens of the United States, and in consideration thereof have given years of suffering and toil, enduring great privations and hardships at the risk of life in conquering, developing, civilizing and building up the prosperity of the state of Arizona.

"We plead that the compact may be kept inviolate by the Government and only changed or modified upon the consent of the citizens of Arizona, whose rights should be considered, and we earnestly pray that if determined to pass the joint statehood bill now before the Senate that it be with the Foraker amendment, leaving the question of the territory to the citizens of the respective territories.

Gratitude is expressed to Senators Harro, Foraker, Baker and others for standing by Arizona.

**WRECKS OFF BRITISH COAST**  
Several Vessels Collide During Continuous Dirty Weather.

LONDON, Jan. 8.—Stormy weather still continues on the British coast and several shipping casualties are reported. The Glasgow steamer Stella Maria collided off Holyhead with the Spanish vessel Oris and both sank. The crew was saved in the boats after drifting all night.

The Belfast schooner Dispatch collided with the Sunderland steamer Dillington off Ramsgate this morning. The Dispatch was towed into Ramsgate, but the Dillington is believed to have sunk with her crew of ten men. Several other vessels were driven ashore at different points, their crews being rescued with great difficulty.
