Damages to Amount of \$26,640 Asked for Alleged Malpractice.

Suits for E30.00 damages for alleged malpractice have been filed in the State Circuit Court against Dr. Etta Hill

Carelessness and un-skillfulness on the part of the attending physician are set forth as the cause of death in both instances. Hawley also avers that he employed another physician and paid out large fees in an effort to save the life of his wife.

C. A. Fraser, administrator of the es-tate of his daughter, Jennie Hawley, has also sued Dr. Schnauffer to recover \$5000 on account of the death of his daughter. This is the statutory amount of damages allowed in such cases. Long & Sweek appear as attorneys in both suits.
