The statute provides that a husband or wife shall not be allowed to testify against one or the other in a criminal case, except in a case of personal violence upon either by the other.

E. H. Goodwin is a well-known young society man who was married to Alice R. D. Goodwin in New York several years ago. Goodwin is well-known in San Francisco and in other places in this section of the country. known in San Francisco and in other places in this section of the country. He and his wife separated. Mrs. Goodwin came to Fortland and discov-ered her husband living at the Fort-land Hotel with another. The latter land Hotel with another. The latter person, upon the arrival upon the scene of the wife, found it convenient to leave at once. Mrs. Goodwin caused the arrest of her husband on a warrant lasued in the Municipal Court. She testified before the grand jury, telling of their marriage, and this evidence Wil-liam Reid, attorney for the accused, argues, should not have been received. Mr. Reid called the attention of Judge

Mr. Reid called the attention of Judge George to the section of the stutute which provides:

"In the investigation of a charge for the purpose of indictment, the grand jury shall receive no other evidence than such as might be given on the trial of the person charged with the crime in question."

Counsel in the course of his argument said:

Counsel in the course of his argu-ment said:

"The defendant contends that the indictment should be set aside, because the evidence of the said Mrs. E. H. Goodwin is wholly incompetent; she swears in the information filed against him in the Municipal Court that she is the wife of the defendant, and this is as far as she can go. She assumes the relation to defendant as that of his wife, and the moment she does this she is disqualified to testify against him, and could not even be called as a

she is disqualified to testify against him, and could not even be called as a witness against him.

'The case of the State of Oregon vs. McGrath, the court says: 'The common law rule prohibiting either a husband or wife from being a witness in a case to which the other was a party was so strict, and the public had such an interest in its observance, that, according to Greenleaf, it could not be relaxed even by their consent.'"
