Some of the driv-ers say that they prefer Burnside to Mor-rison, as the street-car tracks on the lat-ter are fenced off and leave narrow spaces on the sides for the teams. However, it will take more than a few days for travel to adjust itself to where it was before the new Morrison-street bridge was bullt. In the matter of street-car traffic a rec-ord for one hour was kept yesterday with the following result: On the Burnside-street bridge a count of 60 cars was made in one hour making an average of 1600 in larger vehicles still cross on Burnside in very much, In one hour, making an average of 1990 in 18 hours, which at three cents a car would amount to 572 a month. On the Morrison street bridge 40 cars per hour were count

ed, which, at three cents a car would net \$649 a month.

This will be grand opera night at the Marquam, the only opportunity of the ntire season to hear a master-work ren-


