FORGER IN THE TOILS

R. H. Baldwin Under Arrest in Los Angeles.

WANTED BY PORTLAND POLICE

Book Agent Charged With Forging Names of Portland People to Orders is to Be Tried for Similar Offense.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Feb. 2-(Special.) -R. H. Baldwin, the alleged book-agent swindler, was rearraigned in Justice Chambers' Court today on a charge of forgery. His trial was set for February 9. Baldwin is charged with having forged the name of Milo Potter, proprietor of the Hotel Potter, Santa Barbara and Van-Nuys, Los Angeles, to an order for \$256 worth of books. The order was turned in to Scribner & Sons' office in this city and a cash commission of \$39 was paid Baldwin. The man was arrested two weeks ago by local detectives. He is in jail in default of \$1500 bail. Potter denies all knowledge of the order.

The arrest of R. H. Baldwin at Los Angeles brought gladness to the heart of Superintendent J. P. Lockwood, of Scribner's local agency, whom Baldwin fleeced of \$143 last December. A warrant for his arrest was issued here shortly after he had disappeared. Baldwin came here from Seattle in No-

vember, where he had been in the em-ploy of a large book concern and from whom, it is said, he secured considerable money upon forged orders. He entered the employ of Lockwood and within a few days turned in what purported to be an order for \$513 for books from a lady of this city; also one amounting to \$252 from another. Commission was paid Baldwin on these orders, and he immediately left for parts unknown. Later developments show that the larger order was obtained under false pretenses and

he other was a forgery.

Just before, entering the employ of Scribner's local agency, Baldwin visited Superintendent of Schools Rigier and endeavored to secure an order, but falled. Nothing daunted, the versatile book agent signed the superintendent's name to the contract and tried to collect the co sion from Dodd, Mead & Co., of Seattle,

Baldwin while here said he had a brother in business at 86 Fourth street, but his namesake denied the relationship although admitting he was under such obligations to the salesman that he cashed an unauthorized draft for \$360 without making any attempt to recover the money or punish his supposed relative.
