

PRICES STILL FIRM

Desirable Wools Are Commanding Top Figure.

REDUCTION IN BOSTON STOCK

Much Interest Centers in Foreign Grades, Receipts of Which Are Increasing—Territories Are Scarce—Price Current.

BOSTON, Feb. 14.—A feature of the Boston wool market is the noticeable reduction in the stock of domestic wools. On all desirable wools the market is still very firm. There are some marked changes in price, however, a great deal of interest is centered in foreign wools, the receipts of which are increasing. This wool is steady. Territory grades are in small supply. Pooled wools are quiet. Quotations: Territory wools, Idaho No. 1, 19.50; heavy No. 1, 19.00; No. 2, 18.00; medium, 17.50; fine, 17.00.
