> DUE TO GROSS NEGLIGENCE. Coroner of Brooklyn Will Fix Blame for Church Disaster.

NEW YORK, Feb. 28 .- A searching investigation of the fatal accident in the Fiest-Street African Methodist Episcopal Church was begun today by the county and borough authorities of Brooklyn. It was ascertained today that the cause of the collapse was the breaking of a heavy beam supporting the filter and running lengthwise of the church near the south wall. Under the weight of the number of people gathered above, it enapped square in two midway between the front and rear of the church. Coronar Flaherty, of Brooklyn, declared that the disaster was due to gross needligence, and tor was due to gross negligence, and asserted that it is his intention to fix

the blame.
Of the injured there are ten in the hospitals suffering from fractured limbs broken bones and contusions but none of them is believed to be fatally injured. The great majority of injured were removed to their homes and their injuries are of a minor charneter. Death in nearly every case was due to suffocation.

HER MONOPOLY WAS LAWFUL Court Sustains Cuban Countess' Claim Against General Brooke.

NEW YORK, Feb. 37.—In a recent suit brought by Marie Francisca O'Reilly, Countess of Buens Vista, Cuba, against Major-General John E. Brooke, E. S. A., for \$55,000 damages for having, while Governor-General of Cuba, derived her of the hereditary right to slaughter all cattle for the Chry of Havana, Judge Holt, in the United States District Court, has overruled a demurrer filed by Charles W. 
