RAILROAD MAGNATE IS DEAD Richard Somers Hayes, Director of Several Roads. NEW YORK, March 3.—Richard Somers Hayes, railroad capitalist, is dead after a lingering illness at his home here. He was 69 years old, and had been ill more than two years. For over 30 years Mr. Hayes was prominent in the railroad affairs of this country. In the course of that time he was president of the St. Paul & Duluth Railroad Co., vice-president of the Missouri Pacific, president of the New York & Northern, and managing director of the

Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe. For many years he was prominently identified with railroads in Texas, to which state he went on leaving college. He was the engineer of construction of the Texas & Pacific, and was also the receiver of the Texas International, being made president when the receivership was dissolved. Among the railroad companies of which he was a director are the Brooklyn Rapid Transit, Santa Fe, Prescott & Phoenix, Gulf, Colorado & Santa Fe, Delaware & Hudson, California Eastern, Sonora, Southern California and the Long Island. Karowne, Famous Indian Runner. OGDENSBURG, N. Y., March 3.—Ka-

rowne, a noted Indian athlete, is dead at the Coughnawaga reserve, aged 62 years. Forty years ago he had wide reputation as a long-distance runner and in cross-country, and toured Europe with an all-Canadian team. In 1868 Karowne defeated the great Deertoot in a memorable long-distance footrace. Promise of Heavy Fruit Crop. MILTON, Or., March 3.—(Special).—The fruit crop of this vicinity promises to be more than ordinarily heavy this year. Fruitgrowers assert the buds were not in the least injured by the recent cold snap and that the present warm weather is doing much toward hastening growth.

CULLEN TRIES TO KILL HIMSELF Mixed Up With Burglary of Portland Fur Store of a Year Ago. SAN FRANCISCO, March 3.—Matthew Cullen, aged about 36 years, is at the Central Emergency Hospital, suffering from the effects of carbolic acid taken with suicidal intent. Tired, he says, of evading the police who, it is stated, wanted him for burglary alleged to have been committed in Portland, Or., four months ago, the young man surrendered himself to Policeman Cameron today. While waiting for the police wagon he pulled from his pocket a vial of carbolic acid and swallowed a part of the drug. ("Matt" Cullen is the man who "tipped off" to the local detectives the name of James McCarthy, believed to be the man who so cleverly robbed the fur store of E. Silverfield about one year ago. Cullen had been tending bar here for some time prior to the robbery, and according to his statement, McCarthy "planted" costly furs from the Silverfield establishment in Cullen's room for a time. Cullen went to the police with the information. McCarthy was arrested, but released. The police

say Cullen had nothing to do with the robbery. He is originally from Seattle.) Murder is Suspected. BELLINGHAM, Wash., March 3.—Murder is suspected as cause of the death of John Zdenake, whose body was found by Charles Soderlik, Wednesday, in a cabin near Custer. A letter was left saying he had committed suicide. A few days before his death Zdenake deeded his property to Soderlik. Officers are investigating the case. Took Poison and Died. COTTAGE GROVE, Or., March 3.—(Spe-

cial).—Eva Davenport, a woman who conducted a public house here, died this morning from taking poison. A coroner's jury brought in a verdict of premeditated suicide. Skin-Grafting at North Yakima. NORTH YAKIMA, Wash., March 3.—(Special).—What appears to be a successful skin-grafting operation was performed here this morning by local physicians on Miss Essie Goodwin. She was severely burned on the right hand in a laundry and all the skin on the palm came off. The physicians took small pieces of skin from the girl's leg and placed it on the burned part of the hand.
