One striking evidence of this is the fact that money brokers in London, in connection with the current stock market settlement there, healtate to accept American rails as collateral security for large loans, dwing to their fears that present prices are unsable. Foreign markets also are inclined to take a depressing view today of the immediate outlook for peace. The honds of both bell'agerent governments were affected unfavorably by this prospect.
