Increase in Values for Year Over Fourteen Millions.

CAUSED BY NONEXEMPTION

Actual Assessed Values in Oregon Show a Gain of About Three Per Cent as Complied in the Secretary of State's Office.

BALEM, Or., March 14.-(Special.)-The total value of all taxable property in the State of Oregon for 1964 was \$188,055,181.11. as compared with \$172,559,888,58 the year previous, or an increase of \$14.498,292.53. Of this increase in taxable property \$8,86,676 is due to the fact that no exemptions were allowed as in the previous year. The total assessed value of property in this state is but \$5,50,935.35 greater than in 1904, or an increase of about \$2, per cont.

In view of the fact that election expenses in 198 exceeded those of 1900 by \$70,000, it appears that there was in reality a decrease of nearly \$20,000 in ordinary expenditures. The reports from the soveral counties show in the aggregate an increase in the cost of maintaining each office, but these increases are offset by a reduction of \$50,000 in the expenditures.
