SMALL EXCESS OF EXPORTS

Decrease in Figures of Shipments Due to Fall in Price of Cotton and Decline in Grain Exportation.

WASHINGTON, March 21.—The imports into the United States in February, 1935, were larger than in any earlier year in the history of our commerce...

Exports in February, 1935, were \$108,000,000, against \$104,000,000 in the corresponding month of the preceding year...

The excess of exports over imports in the eight months ending with February was \$281,000,000, against \$396,000,000 in the corresponding months of the preceding year...

Exports of cotton in February fell nearly \$11,000,000 in value below those of February of the preceding year, and this was due entirely to the fall in price...

Exports of wheat in February were \$10,000,000, against \$11,000,000 in the corresponding month of the preceding year...

Exports of other commodities in February were \$88,000,000, against \$83,000,000 in the corresponding month of the preceding year...
