Peasants Try to Blow Up Ammunition Train.

SOLDIERS SHOOT THEM DOWN

Poles Resist Troops and Are Killed In Large Numbers-New Governor Tries Conciliation - Panic in South Russia.

ST. PETERSBURG, March 24.—Advices from Warsaw state that a mobattacked a troop train of the Vistuian Rallway near Viodava and that a pitched battle took place between the peasants and the soldiers.

The object of the mob was to destroy the train with dynamite, as it carried large quantities of ammunition des-

large quantities of ammunition des-tined for the front. Three times bombs were thrown under the locomotive, but

each time they failed to explode.

Finally the troops were directed to fire on the mob, which they did, with the result that many were killed and

PEASANTS SLAIN BY POLICE Two Volleys From Rifles Are Answer to Crowd of Laborers.

KUTNO, Russian Poland. March II.—
Ten pensants were killed and 50 wers wounded at Lamenta, March II. as the result of the shooting by infantry sent to quell disturbances. A crowd of pensants from Benignowa proceeded to Lamenta to induce the farm leborers to strike, and rioting occurred. The Chief of Police, with a company of soldiers, went to the scene and the troops fired two volleys at the pensants, killing two and wounding 50. The latter were brought in carts to the hospital, where seven men and one woman died. Eleven others are dyirg.

(Kutno is situated 70 miles west of Varsaw. It has a population of about 20,000 nouis.)

BITTER HATRED OF RUSSIA. It Bursts Into Flames at Shooting of Polish Peasants.

WARSAW, March 23.-67 P. M.-The shooting of peasants at Lamenta has shooting of peasants at Lamenta has aroused intense excitement in the whole district. The action of the authorities in shooting down unarmed peasants is angrily criticised, and a deputation of residents of Kutno is proceeding towards Warsaw to lay complaints before the Governor-General. The troubles began a week ago, when the mobilization of horses was ordered. The peasants refused to comply, and March 21 about 156 peasants gathered on the road near peasants gathered on the road near Lamenta, when the Chief of Police at Kutne arrived on the scene with a com-pary of infantry and ordered the crowd to disperse. The people refused to obey, and the Chief of Police then ordered the

and the Chief of Police then ordered the soldiers to fire. The peasants, not understanding Russian, remained in the road until the soldiers aimed.

Then they broke and ran. The troops fired three volleys at the fleeing crowd, and 50 peasants fell, two of them dead. All the wounded were shot in the backs. It is said that the Chief of Police refused to allow the wounded to be removed and that he flually ordered them to be taken to Kutno, six hours' journey, in peasants' caris, and owing to lack of medical attendance, eight of the wounded died while on their way to Kutno, and the directors report that nine others are in a nepeless condition.

This the priests refused to do, and the funerals occurred this morn-ing at the cemetery at Kutno. The serv-loes were attended by an immense conte of people and the coffins were hidden beneath masses of flowers.

TRIES TO CONCILIATE POLAND New Governor Goes to the Catholic Church and Seeks Ald.

WARSAW, March 25 .- The new Gov ernor-General M. Maximovitch, arrived in Warsaw today. His official entrance into the city favorably impressed the Poles. After attending a service at the Orthodox Church, the Governor-General went to the Catholic cathedral, where he was received by the archbishop and remained for the celebration of mu This was the first occasion on which Governor-General had attended a atholic service on assuming office since the revolution of 1851. Later the Governor-General visited the arch-bishop and requested the support of Catholic clergy in restoring order in Polund.

The friendly attitude of the Gov-ernor-General is regarded as an indication that the St. Petersburg government intends adopting a more conciliatory policy toward Poland.



From Grangeville, the nearest town, relief parties are on the way with provisions and clothing. Whitebird had about 6000 population. A number of mines in the vicinity gave omployment and there is a rich stockraising country adjacent. The town was established many years ago.
