"You get up late and come down here and drink and consort with men you have never seen before," be said to the women. "I have not come here to scold you. I am telling you facts. You go home tenight tired out. You do not feel at all contented, happy. You even feel tired out and ill. And you know why. Aside from the immortality, you are not leading. from the immorality, you are not leading the kind of a life conducive to health and happiness and you know it. It is not only the immorality, it is the outrage against nature. There is a way out. It is the way of the cross."

WILD WEST SHOW BY INDIANS Troupe From Indian Territory May Exhibit on the Trail.


