For the love of a woman, John Schofield purchased a revolver, went into a nt and fired a bullet into his forehead. Death resulted, and his lifeless form was found at 1 o'clock yesterday afternoon. A weapon by his side, with bullet missing, told the grim story of he suicide, and a note in a book purported to say why the deed was done. He was 30 years of age. It is known he was infatuated with a woman, although he said nothing of this in his

Miss Mattle Doyle, formerly employed at the Merchants Hotel as a kitchen helper, is being sought by Acting Cor-oner pley, but as yet has not been found. It is believed she knows a great deal concerning the youthful suicide, for it is said that she sold to him the re-volver with which he killed himself. Schofield had evidently premeditated his deed, for he had been despendent, and there was a sketch of his journeyings in the note book. He made certain that he left enough information as to his identity and how he met death. He wrote that he had traveled with Ring-ling's circus, had worked in Wasco County harvest fields a while and had ent two weeks in a local hospital; im mediately after arriving here. That was about nine months ago. He was from Cleveland, O., where he has relatives. No inquest will be held.
