

STOP ALL TEAMS

Another Strike Will Con- vulse Chicago.

CAUSED BY RIVAL UNIONS

Labor Federation's Strife With Socialists.

FIGHTING TO SAVE PRESTIGE

Teamsters Will Strike to Help the Locked-Out Garment-Workers, and Disorderly Scenes May Result.

CHICAGO, April 6.—(Special.)—Beginning at 3 o'clock tomorrow morning, Chicago will face a general strike of teamsters, a labor movement always accompanied by riots and bloodshed.

All Teamsters Will Be Drawn In. If the strike is ordered, all of the railway express wagon-drivers in the city are expected to be drawn into the conflict.

Coal, furniture, truck and provision wagon-drivers will be drawn into the strike. No union driver will be permitted to do any work for Montgomery, Ward & Co. until the garment-workers' grievances are adjusted.

Federation's Fight for Life. The Chicago Federation of Labor, urged on by the American Federation of Labor, will pay all striking drivers benefits.

It is feared that the socialists will be able to carry out their plan and break up the American Federation, if the old National body does not get out in the field and win the garment-workers' strike.

BRIEF TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

An electric railway is projected from Cripple Creek to Colorado Springs and Pueblo, Colo.

A voluntary increase of 30 per cent in wages has been given employees of the Interstate Steel Works at Quireton, Pa.

The Reorganized Church of Latter Day Saints is holding a convention at Lamont, Ia., which will take steps to raise the debt of \$135,000 on Grassland College, Nauvoo, Ill., has asked for the next convention.

Princeton University will in June send a party of students, headed by Dr. Marcus S. Farr, to Montana and Wyoming, to collect fossil bones and skeletons of prehistoric animals and to camp in Yellowstone Park.

William F. Childs, a colored policeman, has been appointed desk sergeant by Chief O'Neil, of Chicago. This is the first such promotion of a colored policeman in the history of Chicago, and possibly of the country.

The Security Trust & Safe Deposit Company has been appointed receiver for the Johnson Forge Company, of Wilmington, Del. John R. Johnson, who made the application for a receiver, alleges that the company is insolvent and that it owes him \$18,880.
