MANY COMING TO SEE THE FAIR

Exploitation Bureau is Arranging a Number of Special Excursions.

CITIES TO TAKE HOLIDAYS

One Hundred Thousand Visitors Within 1000 Miles of Portland Will be Attracted by Low Railroad Rates.

The Department of Exploitation of the Exposition has created an excursion bureau which under the management of Colin H. McIsaac, is expected to bring to Portland during the Lewis and Clark Fair more than 100,000 people from the Northwest district who would otherwise remain at home and pay no attention to the show being held in Portland. This bureau will have for its field all the territory within a radius of 100 miles of Portland, and will begin at once its work of exploitation and its campaign for the organization of excursions to the Exposition.

The men will be first sent to Denver, San Diego and Helena, where they will commence their work. They will take up with the City Council the commercial bodies, the local agents of the railroads, the newspapers and the influential citizens the feasibility of arranging a large excursion to visit the Exposition on Denver day or San Diego day or upon the day set apart for Helena, as the case may be. It is hoped by this means to arouse public interest to such an extent that while train loads of people will be brought from each city, from the far points the bureau will have but one excursion, though as the distance shortens between Portland and the objective point sought more than one trip will be made, according to the population and the desire on the part of the people to see the Fair.

Cities to Have Holidays. In each town an effort will be made to arrange a municipal holiday, in order that the city officials and clerks in the departments may be enabled to come on the excursion. The city programme to be followed at the Fair will be given into the hands of the city officials, or to a committee on arrangements to be appointed by them, and a programme will be arranged for each day.

New Sellwood Republican Club. A Republican club was organized at Sellwood last night, with the following officers: President, W. M. La Forge; vice-president, E. A. Austin; secretary, J. P. PACKERS FACE THREE CHARGES

Slaughter-House on Macadam Road Held to Be a Nuisance.

BATTLE ROYAL IS NOW ON

James M. Neal and Associates Are Fighting Against Determined Attempt to Close Their Plant.

Deputy City Attorney Fitzgerald yesterday morning filed a third charge against James M. Neal and his associates in the Pacific States Packing Company, operating a slaughter-house on the Macadam road and Seymour street. It alleges the establishment is a public nuisance, in a broader and more general sense than is set forth in another complaint, filed last week.

Defense to Be Heard Today.

The battle royal is on between the city and the defendants in this case, for the latter are fighting for the right to conduct their slaughter-house in the corporate limits of Portland, while the prosecution is determined to close the plant.

It is expected that the defense will call numerous witnesses, including employees, in its efforts to disprove what was shown by the prosecution.

Operates Under City Franchise.

It is expected that the defense will also call witnesses to show that the company is operating the slaughter-house under a franchise granted by the City Council, and will attempt to show that this has never been nullified, as charged by the prosecution.

ACCIDENT AT FAIR GROUNDS.

Workman Falls From Scaffold Near Top of Washington Building. Lewis Smith, a carpenter employed on the Washington building, fell from a scaffolding 45 feet above the ground, shortly after 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon, and was badly injured. That he was not killed is little short of a miracle considering the distance he fell and the perilous network of scaffolding through which he passed. His body struck two projecting planks, but avoided a number of others and struck in the soft mud at the west end of the structure. When picked up and examined by a physician, he was found to have sustained a dislocation of the hip and a number of severe bruises. Unless he received internal injuries of a serious nature his recovery is assured. He was taken to St. Vincent's Hospital.

RELICS OF GREAT EXPEDITION

Room in the Fine Arts Building Set Apart for Exhibit. Relics of the Lewis and Clark expedition are to have one of the rooms in the Fine Arts building at the Exposition. The exhibit was decided yesterday, and arrangements will be made at once for securing a large number of relics that are known to be accessible as loans. Major O. E. Clark, grandson of the explorer, has a fine collection of powder-horns and other pieces of equipment, and Mrs. J. K. Clark, a granddaughter living in New York, has a camp chest which was given to Captain Clark by Marquis La Fayette. These, with many other interesting remnants of the great expedition, will be secured for the room in the art gallery.
