Sharp Recovery in General List Maintained to Close-Good Railroad Reports.

NEW YORK, May 1.-Today's stock mar-NEW YORK, May I.—Today's stock market was a striking demonstration of how mancial affairs adjust themselves to any contingency that is foreseen with sufficient clearness. The precipitate fall in prices on Saturday caused a real uneasiness throughout the financial district for fear of the consequences of the shrinkage in values, to say mothing of the dampers which were binned at on Saturday in the vague rumor-mongering incident to a bear market. The event of the day proved that the precautionary measures which resulted were so abundantly effective as to turn the demoralized weakness into a quite exuberant show of strength. An important part of the measures in anticipation of course, lay with the speculative element itself and were made in the form of sales for the short accounts which were put out durting Saturday in almost unlimited amounts. The volume of outstanding short contracts proved so excessive that the expected offerings today falled to provide material for this potential demand, and before the case the shorts were scrambling to secure applies to make good their contracts. The measure of the inflation of the market was thus taken and the downward course of prices decisively checked, having reached a point where a sufficient demand intervened to absorb the selling.

There can be no doubt that a very large part of the buying today was as a measure of protection by financial interests powerful chough to take these steps to save themselves and their associates from the serious effects threatened by the downward plunge in prices and the rapid shrinkage in valuations forming the basis for huse credits. Se-curities purchased for such a purpose are not expected to be held permanently, and may be looked for in the offerings for sale on any moderate recovery or when the pur-pose of steadying the market is effected. These

The support in the market today was not made effective without a sharp struggle which at one time caused a threatening setback after the first stand had been made against depression. Sepression.
