When interviewed last night Mr. Samuel said: "My visit to the East was for the pur-pose of attending the convention of man-agers of the Equitable Life. At that conagers of the Equitable Life. At that convention there were 28 managers present, and the sole purpose of the meeting was to discover and remedy if possible the turmoil existing within the company. That there is strife within the company goes without saying, but it is not nearly as had as is reported in the papers. The trouble that exists, however, is between James W. Alexander, president of the society, and James H. Hyde, vice president. From the newspaper reports it has appeared that the dissension arose from the fact that Mr. Hyde is a man of extravagant tastes and spent money lavishly. gant tastes and spent money lavishly. Mr. Alexander, and in this respect the managers agreed with him, thought that such a character was unbecoming in a

trust funds.
"It has been reported that the \$100,000 coming-out party given by Mr. Hyde in favor of his niece, Miss Ripley, was paid favor of his niece, Miss Ripley, was paid out of the company's funds, but this is not a fact and there is no truth in it. 


