NEW YORK, May 2.-The stock market witled back today into dull trading and slugmaller aggregate than for any full day's

which culminated on Monday is almost certain to be followed by a series of diminishing fluctuations as prices seek their normal level. With the speculative factors out of the market the range of prices became narrow and the market inert, offering little attraction for operations by professionals who seek their advantage entirely in the changes in the price level.

It was demonstrated today that the upward movement of prices of yesterday was but one of the oscillations incident to the subsidence of the speculation. Stocks came upon the market with some freedom today, and the definite downward tendency established scattered the hopes of such speculators as had seen indications of a revival of speculation in yesterday's movement. Most of the day's business was done in the first hour, and an unusually large part of that was for foreign account.
