NORA STONE THE VICTIM Accused of Hiding Murderer Flore

The Two Had Quarreled, and the Accused Woman, It Is Charged, Threw a Lighted Lamp

at the Other.

Blanche Thon,pkins, a young woman of ill repute, who struck Nora Stone with a lighted lamp on March 3 last, caus-ing burns from the effects of which she died on April 15 following, was placed on trial before Judge George and a jury yesterday for murder in the sec-ond degree, the penalty for which is life imprisonment. The trial will be conclud-ed today. The evidence adduced showed Dr. David T. Day, honorary commissioner of mines and metallurgy.

JURY ACQUITS V. TASONE.

Vincenso Tasone, accused of con cealing Joseph Florebello, the murderer of Amelia Siriani, was tried before Judge Cleland yesterday as an accessory after the fact of the commission of the murder, and was ac quitted.

Piorebello shot and killed Mrs. Siriant in her store on First street on February 10, and he committed suicide in a closet adjoining the house occupied by Tasone on Fifth street, north of Marquam Gulch, at midnight on February 14. Detective Weiner had discovered the hiding-place of Fiore-bello and the latter shot himself rather than gubmit to arrest.

At the trial yesterday the evidence showed that Fiorbello was hiding in the closet for three days and that Vincenso Calabretta was aware of the fact. The only evidence showing knowledge on the part of Tazone was that he started to put some kindling-wood in the closet and Calabretta told him not to go there because Fiorebello was there. It was also shown that members of Tasone's family were aware of the fact, but there was no testimony that they held any communication whatever with the murderer or in any manufer assisted him derer or in any manner assisted him or gave him food. Calabretta was not arrested, because he disappeared, and the officers have not since been able to locate him.


