BRIDGE REPAIRS PROGRESSING.—Repairs to the Burnside bridge are progressing as rapidly as could be expected under the circumstances. At the east approach the contractors have started replanking the deck, and at the west end the planking is also under way. It will be several days, however, before teams can be allowed to cross on one side. According to the contract, one side is to be made ready for teams first, and in this way the inconvenience to the public will be somewhat relieved. On the east approach and bridge spans the double tracks will be laid nearer the center, but will spread to meet the present tracks across the draw. This change will do away with the curves at the east end approach.

OCCUPATION TAX NOT POPULAR.—The finance committee of St. Johns met last evening in an effort to fix up a schedule for the proposed occupation tax. Members of the committee realize that it will not be easy to adjust the occupation tax so that it will be satisfactory to all. What opposition there is to the measure will be developed when the schedule is completed and submitted to the inspection of those who will be called upon to pay it. It is feared that an occupation tax will prejudice outsiders against St. Johns. Whether there will be a formal protest made against this tax remains to be developed.

FOR MUNICIPAL JUDGE.—Heavy odds were offered on the streets yesterday that Otto J. Kraemer would be the next Municipal Judge of Portland. The race for this important office, it is generally conceded, lies between Kraemer and his most prominent opponent, the friends of Kraemer, in referring to his strong points, say that he is a native son of Oregon, that he was raised and educated in this city, that he is closely identified with its business interests and its social life, and that he has in his favor an absolutely clean record, and that he has had four years' experience as a Judge. He has been endorsed by the bar of Portland, he has received the unanimous endorsement of the Municipal Association, and he is favored by the Republican Club, an organization made up of many of the most prominent men of this city. The friends of Kraemer say it is generally conceded in political circles that the withdrawal of Gustav Anderson from the race for Municipal Judge absolutely insures the success of Kraemer's candidacy at today's primaries.

PROTEST AGAINST SALOONS.—At the meeting of the Sarah Kerns W. C. T. U. yesterday, in the First United Evangelical Church, East Sixth and Market streets, a strong protest was made against the saloons recently licensed near the entrance to the Fair grounds. It was the judgment of the union that the license should be revoked or the entrance to the Fair be changed so that women and children might attend without encountering so many saloons on the way. It was decided to hold a mothers' meeting Thursday afternoon, May 18, at the home of Mrs. J. S. Courtney, at East Eighth street North.

DEATH OF LOUISE M. ROBERTSON.—At the residence of her sister, Mrs. A. W. Lee, 129 East Fourteenth street, Miss Louise M. Robertson died April 27, 1880. She was born at Salem, Or., April 6, 1880, and at the age of 7 years moved with her parents to Oregon City, where she lived until five years ago, when she came to Portland, where she resided until her death. She is survived by a father and mother, five sisters and two brothers, to mourn her loss.

FIRE IN COFFEE-HOUSE.—Fire, originating in an unknown manner, wrought damage to the extent of about \$1000 in "Billy's" coffee-house, 222 Yamhill street, at 4:30 A. M. yesterday. Firemen worked for an hour to extinguish the flames. He was sentenced by Municipal Judge Hogue, who yesterday received from the executive a request for a statement of the facts in the case. Judge Hogue immediately replied, saying Keith, in his opinion, should not be pardoned, or his sentence commuted.

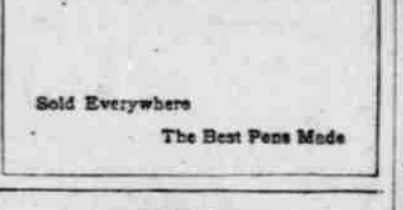
