

HAS NOT SOLD OUT

Klamath Canal Company Holds Out for Its Terms.

GOVERNMENT TO CONDEMN

Property in Klamath Basin Valued at \$100,000, and Government Might Pay \$150,000, but \$250,000 Is Wanted.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, May 10.—Up to the present time the Government has been unable to come to any satisfactory arrangement with the Klamath Canal Company, whereby that corporation will relinquish its rights and holdings in the Klamath basin and withdraw in order that the Government may undertake the construction of the Klamath irrigation project.

At a recent conference between officials of the company and the engineers of the Reclamation Service, the company renewed its offer to sell out for \$250,000. This offer was rejected. The figure named is very much more than the property is worth. An estimate on the property and work done by the company places the actual value at not to exceed \$100,000, and it is the general opinion among Government engineers and residents of the Klamath basin that a bonus of \$50,000 additional is more than ample inducement to the company to step aside. The latest advice received by the Reclamation Service here is that the company is holding out for its own price, and will not consider an offer of \$150,000.

It may be set down as a fact that the Government will not pay \$250,000, and it is by no means certain that Secretary Hitchcock will approve the purchase of this property at \$150,000, although the matter has never been presented to him, and will not be until an agreement is reached between the Reclamation Service and the canal company. If, after a reasonable time, an amicable arrangement cannot be made, it is understood the Government will acquire that property by condemnation proceedings.

Colonel Mitchell in Washington.

NEW MINISTER FROM RUSSIA

Cassini Sent to Madrid, and Rosen Will Succeed Him.

WASHINGTON, May 10.—Count Cassini, the Russian Ambassador to this country, has been transferred to Madrid. He will be succeeded here by Baron Rosen, until recently Russian Minister at Tokyo. Count Cassini was offered the Ambassadorship to Madrid two months ago and accepted it.

That the news of his appointment to Madrid should have become known before official announcement at St. Petersburg, has caused some annoyance to the Ambassador, but, as he had confided the fact to one of his diplomatic conferees, the word was passed along, and it seemed best to make an official announcement. The Ambassador will await Baron Rosen's arrival here sometime in June, before sailing for Europe.

His presentation at Madrid will occur sometime in the Fall. The Russian Ambassador at Madrid, whom Count Cassini succeeds, has been appointed one of the Ministers in the Council of the Empire.

"Seven years in a country as the personal representative of one's sovereign," said the Ambassador today, "makes one feel almost a part of the country. Regret is not a strong enough word to characterize one's feelings. I leave in Washington your great country many warm and dear friends." Baron Rosen de Planches, the Italian Ambassador, will become a member of the diplomatic corps upon the departure of Count Cassini, who now holds that position by virtue of seniority of presentation. Baron Rosen, the new Russian Ambassador, will be ranked even by the new Brazilian Ambassador, who will be presented some time this month.

In coping to Washington as Russia's second Ambassador to the United States, Baron Rosen returns to the field of his former activities. He was formerly Consul-General at New York, and later chargé d'affaires at Washington for a short time. He is over 50 years of age. He will be accompanied to Washington by his wife and daughter.

Baron Rosen has served as Russia's Minister to Mexico, Serbia, Greece, Roumania, and more recently to Japan. Diplomats here say that he was greatly opposed to the war, and that his reports from Tokyo about the preparedness of the Japanese for war were minimized at St. Petersburg. The new Ambassador speaks excellent English, as well as several other languages.

HIGH RENT FOR CHURCHES

Catholics Claim \$1,000,000 for Use by Troops in Philippines.

WASHINGTON, May 9.—Secretary Taft has been informed by Monsignor Falconer, the apostolic delegate to the United States, that a number of claims arising from the use by United States troops of church property in the Philippines during the period of military

occupation, amounting to \$1,000,000 or \$1,500,000, have been presented there. The Secretary called the Philippine Commission for information concerning these claims, and was informed that they had been turned over to Major-General Wade, who was in command at the time the claims were presented there. The Secretary will make an inquiry of the Philippine division, with headquarters at New York, concerning them.

Schiller Memorial at Chicago.

CHICAGO, May 10.—Impressive ceremonies last night brought to a close the festival with which the German Americans of Chicago have been commemorating the 100th anniversary of the death of Friedrich Schiller. The Auditorium was the scene of the final programme, which an audience of 400, Mayor Duane among them, followed with enthusiasm. After Hans von Schiller's orchestra had played Beethoven's "Dedication of the House," the official representative of the King of Wurtemberg, Major-General Albert von Pfister, of Stuttgart, delivered an address. A cablegram was sent expressing the thanks and good will of Chicago's Germans to the King of Wurtemberg. Herr Schiller-Steinwarte, secretary of the German Embassy at Washington, spoke as the representative of Emperor Wilhelm, expressing the sentiment of friendship which the mutual worship of Schiller had created between Germany and the United States.

FOUND ARSENIC IN BODY

Doctors and Chemists Testify Hoch's Wife Was Poisoned.

CHICAGO, May 10.—At the trial of "Bluebeard," Johann Hoch, Oscar Lowe, who held the post-mortem examination over the body of Mrs. Walcker-Hoch, described minutely the examination. On cross-examination he admitted that at the time of the first examination he thought he detected signs of kidney trouble. Later, however, he was convinced that there were no indications of such disease. The microscopic analysis was taken up by the testimony of Dr. Walter S. Haines, professor in Rush Medical College, and Professor De la Fontaine, instructor of chemistry in the public schools. Both testified that they had found arsenic in the body of Mrs. Walcker-Hoch. Prof. De la Fontaine stated that he had subjected the embalming fluid to all the tests known to science in the effort to find traces of arsenic, and had failed.

BLOODSHED IN SPITE OF TRUCE

Three Men Injured in Riot and Union Man Shot Dead.

CHICAGO, May 10.—It was generally understood by both sides to the strike that there would be no disturbances while President Roosevelt was in the city. Notwithstanding this, a riot broke out, one of them taking place on Michigan avenue, a short time after President Roosevelt had passed along and in which a number of men were cut and shot. The injured were: Joseph Stewart, colored, shot in the right leg; John Highlow, colored, stabbed in the face, having a head cut; Ed Hubbard, colored, cut in the right cheek.

The fight commenced when five union men, including Stewart, a non-union driver. They rushed at a score of his comrades answered and a pitched battle followed at once. One of the five union men drew a big revolver and fired, striking Stewart in the leg.

The employers sent out more wagons today, with fewer guards than at any previous time since the strike began.

Dunne Wants No Troops.

During the luncheon at the Merchants' Club in the afternoon Mayor Dunne and President Roosevelt held an extended talk in which the strike situation was discussed. The mayor explained the present situation in the city and told of the measures taken to preserve peace and order. He told the President that the most alarming stage of the strike had passed and that the police have control of the situation. The mayor also informed the President that there is no need for federal aid in Chicago at the present time.

Union Teamster Shot Dead.

George S. Pierce, a union teamster, was shot and killed tonight by George Walden, a deputy sheriff, while guarding a Wells Fargo Express Company wagon. Walden was formerly a member of the Teamsters' Union, and Pierce taunted him with his change of employment. Angered by the language of Pierce, Walden drew a revolver and fired one shot, the bullet striking Pierce just above the heart. He died while being taken to the hospital. Walden was arrested.

Eight hundred pupils of the Hendricks public school went on a strike today because a colored teamster of the Peabody Coal Company delivered a load of coal at the building. Many teamsters stopped near the school and prompted the pupils in the strike. Police sent to the school are alleged to have used clubs on more than one pupil. The crowd quickly scattered.

In a riot this afternoon at Twenty-second Place, Edward Wright, a strike sympathizer, was shot in the groin by a non-union teamster, who was driving a United States Express wagon. The usual number of police were on strike duty today, with the exception of 400, who were withdrawn to act as guards for President Roosevelt, but there was scarcely any evidence of a strike, beyond the presence of the police and occasional caravans of guarded wagons.

Sixteen hundred deputy sheriffs have been sworn in for strike duty, and this body of men also was in service today.

Negroes Recent Slander.

More than 1000 negroes assembled at the Bethel African Methodist Church last night and adopted resolutions regarding the action of the Department Store Drivers' Union, which the resolutions asserted circulated a "slandering" letter against negro drivers, declaring them to be "loafers" and not willing to work. This charge was denounced as a willful and malicious falsehood urged against men who proved their value by risking their lives to obtain work. The resolutions also called upon the mayor to "save hard-working citizens from that kind of protection which lets the strike go on and sends the victim to the jails and hospitals."

FRANCE

Japan Accuses Her of Active Aid to Russia.

CLAIMS BRITISH SUPPORT

Newspapers Demand Alliance Be Made Effective—Detailed Statement of Breach of Neutrality—France's Answer.

SPECIAL CABLE

LONDON, May 10.—The news from Tokyo is of the most alarming character. The outbreak of popular indignation against France for her violations of neutrality is growing, and already equals the bitter feeling that prevailed against Russia prior to the breaking out of the war. Should Russia return to France to French waters, it is doubtful if the Japanese government could claim the populace, and hostilities must result. These would surely involve great Britain in the war, and the outcome would be in doubt.

Diplomats here in London unite in characterizing the situation as extremely grave. France's attitude while on the surface conciliatory, underneath is far from that, and the French official class seems determined to resent Japan's protests, claiming that French neutrality is on a standard by itself, and should not be compared with that of any other nation.

DELIBERATELY AIDING RUSSIA

Japanese Paper Says French Duplicitous Merits British Intervention.

TOKIO, May 10.—The Nichi Nichi, discussing French neutrality, while on the surface conciliatory, underneath is far from that, and the French official class seems determined to resent Japan's protests, claiming that French neutrality is on a standard by itself, and should not be compared with that of any other nation.

"French duplicity," the Nichi Nichi will say, "affords the occasion." Continuing, the Nichi Nichi will declare that the assistance given Vice-Admiral Rojdestvensky is a deliberate breach of neutrality and a violation of a definite pledge given to Japan. It will say further:

Japan is justified in assuming that France is deliberately assisting Russia. France's position as Russia's ally is well known, and sympathy, but after France gave a definite pledge, nothing remains to exonerate France from the charge of duplicity. Japan never suspected that the French republic would be guilty of double-dealing. The prestige of France as a champion of civilization demands that she correct her attitude and exonerate herself of the charge of duplicity. In conclusion, the Nichi Nichi will say: "Let France publicly range her sword on the side of Russia or manfully adhere to the principle of strict neutrality."

JAPAN'S CASE AGAINST FRANCE

Says Her Neglect Helped Russian Fleet to Reach China Sea.

PARIS, May 10.—(Globe P. M.)—In the course of an apparently authoritative statement published here today of Japan's case against France, a summary is given of various acts of assistance rendered to the Russian fleet by the French Pacific squadron at Cherbourg, Dakar, Algiers, Jibuti, Magura, Kamanah Bay, Port David and Hongkong Bay. The conclusion of the Japanese government are stated to be as follows: "First—Without questioning the good faith of France, Japan holds that French orders to observe neutrality have been insufficiently executed. Second—France should have taken sufficient measures beforehand to prevent violations of neutrality. Instead of securing the observance of neutrality after Japan's remonstrance. Third—In default of sufficient surveillance, Vice-Admiral Rojdestvensky has been greatly facilitated in the accomplishment of his mission and in gaining access to Chinese waters. Consequently, it was for the ends of warfare that Vice-Admiral Rojdestvensky utilized, on successive occasions, French waters both for anchoring and refueling and in awaiting the arrival of reinforcements. The foregoing is said to be substantially Japan's position, both as to the past and as to the basis of any further claims arising from the alleged breaches of neutrality.

STILL USING FRENCH WATERS

Action of Russia Bringing on the Franco-Japanese Crisis.

TOKIO, May 10.—The Government maintains reserve, but the Indo-Chinese situation seems to be rapidly approaching a crisis. Following the repeated assurances of the French Foreign Minister, M. Delcasse, to Dr. Montono, Japanese Minister at Paris, that the vessels of the Russian Pacific squadron were outside territorial waters, the Navy Department here has received reliable reports that a portion of the squadron was inside Hongkong Bay, a short distance north of Kamanah Bay, the morning of May 6, and it is generally believed that the fourth (Nobogoff) division of the squadron will use French waters to coal and take on other supplies and clear their bottoms. It is difficult to predict future events.

The Japanese government has been urged to accept France's assurances that the Russian warships have remained outside territorial waters and to act accordingly. The situation against France commercially is growing and, despite governmental representations, a motion to boycott French goods may reach a vote in the Chamber of Commerce.

DENIES HE SOLD RUSSIA COAL

French Concessionary at Kamranh Bay Answers His Critics.

PARIS, May 10.—The Marquis de Barthélemy, who with Count de Pourtales, operates the French Concession at Kamranh Bay, Annah, the course of an interview today denies that the establishment furnished coal or provisions to the Russian squadron. He said: "The maximum of coal coaling facilities is 70 tons. This is an insignificant quantity for the 32 warships of Admiral Rojdestvensky's squadron, which establishes the fact that we could not recall the squadron. Concerning the charge that the squadron secured coal at Saigon, the fact is that a small coaling depot exists on the Mekong River, not far from Saigon. At the outbreak of the war, the Russians bought a large tract of land there, erected sheds and accumulated supplies, practically of coal which was bought originally from Japan. It is to this depot that Admiral Rojdestvensky sent his coilers, but no warships approached the depot. This was Russian coal, placed upon Russian land and loaded upon Russian transports. This was not a violation of neutrality. France could not prevent the Russians from taking their own coal on their own land. If the natives were at fault in selling the land to the Russians, the Japanese would

TOGO HAS CARD UP SLEEVE

British Admirals Think Submarines Will Spring Surprise.

SPECIAL CABLE. LONDON, May 10.—One of the leading Admirals in the British navy, who is in a position to know the plans of the belligerents in a general way at least, in discussing with the correspondent of the Publishers Press the outlook, said: "I feel certain that Admiral Togo has a surprise up his sleeve and that Rojdestvensky will find this out very soon. Togo's apparent effort to dodge the Russian fleet has been the purpose of doing so, and when he strikes, he will do so good and hard. Do you recall the fact that the Japanese navy is advancing rapidly after the fall of Port Arthur? Have secured a large number of submarines, many of them of British and German make? They have not been heard from since, but you can depend upon it that the Japanese are making use of them at Saesbo and that they soon will be tried against the Russians. And their crews will be all experienced."

"Togo knows what it would mean to the Japanese cause to permit Russia to wrest the supremacy of the sea away from them, and he is endeavoring to do so at the right time to secure the maximum of result with the minimum of expenditure of risk. He will likely surprise the admirals here by a brilliant and unexpected movement that will remove the Russian menace from the Japanese coast."

Similar views are held by the British naval strategists and the belief is growing that sensational news can be expected soon.

RUSSIANS CLAIM ADVANTAGE

Combined Fleet the Stronger—Time Required to Coal.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 10.—Much satisfaction was expressed at the Admiralty at the uniting of the divisions of Admiral Rojdestvensky's squadron, experts calculating that the Russian Admiral now enjoys a superior career in adversity of 5 per cent of the ships of the line. The impression here is that it will require a week for Negoboff to coal and get everything ship-shape for the final stage of the journey to Vladivostok.

SPIES ARRESTED AT TOKIO
