Disposition of Large Estate Depends on Residence.

WITNESSES ARE CALLED

If Her Residence Was in Portland Will Holds, if in Pasadena, It Must Follow the California Law on Estates.

Cyrus A. Doiph, who was the confiden-W. Reed for many years, testified at the hearing of the contest of her will, which is still in progress in the County Court, that Mrs. Reed never ceased to be a resident of Portland. One of the principal contentions in the case is whether Mrs. Reed, at the time of her death, was a resident of Portland or of Pasadena, and if the California statute will govern the disposition of her estate. If the contestants win it will prevent the founding of the "Reed Institute." Mr. Dolph explained that Mrs. Reed and

her husband, Simeon G. Reed, were pipneers of Portland, and made their fortune in Oregon. Their friends and relatives lived there, and while in her latter years Mrs. Reed lived much of the time in Pasadena, Portland never ceased to be her residence. She was interested in this and its institutions and people, and desired to assist them, and in the disc sion of her plans always desired to onsidered a permanent resident of Port-

Mrs. W. S. Ladd, who knew Mrs. Reed in the pioneer days and thereafter, testiced that she always considered Mrs. Reed one of Portland's people, and Mrs. Helen Ladd Corbett also testified that she considered Mrs. Reed, from views which she had frequently expressed, regarded Port-

land as her home.

J. S. Patterson, of Pasadena, who was with Mrs. Reed two nights before she died testified that Mrs. Reed expressed a desire that her remains be placed in Riv-erview Cemetery beside those of her hus-band, and Mrs. Reed spoke always of

Portland as her home place.
