#### Physician Is Called.

With great presence of mind. Montgomery stepped in the wings and asked a stage hand to send for a physician. In another moment he was back on the stage taking his part and listening to the tall piece as spoken by Miss Chamberlain, the leading lady. Blood was flowing from the wound as the act closed, and it is doubtful if either could have and it is doubtful if either could have stood it a minute longer. Between the first and second acts a physician took three stitches in the wound, and Montgomery played out the plece. After the final curtain he was assisted to his residence, where the wound was again dressed. He went on as usual hast night, but when the end of the first act came both Monigomery and Neale were ner-vous and careful that the unpleasant episode should not be repeated. "I cannot blame Mr. Neale," said Mr.

Montgomery last night. He was in his part and was extremely nervous. He struck hard at me, as he always does, in an effort to make the scene as realistic as possible. I felt the force of the blow against my collar, but did not realize I against my collar, but did not realize I was struck until I put my hand up to my neck and found the knife still sticking there. I stepped in the wings and pulled it out. As Neale fell away from me he said, 'I've stabbed you. Frank' but I did not realize it until fully half a minute afterward. I whispered to a stagehand to send for a doctor, then stepped quickly back on the stage and went on. The act didn't last but two minutes longer, and I had no lines to speak, so it wasn't very hard. Immediately after the curtain felt I got a physician and had the wound dressed."
