### Men Well Matched.



### Tacoma Longshoremen Board Centennial, Armed and Angry.

TACOMA, Wash., May 17 .- A desperate battle occurred on the decks of the steamer Centennial last night, in which several men were slightly in-jured and three may have been drowned. The Centennial, from San Francisco via Seattle, brought from the latter port a gang of 1s men to work the ship's cargo here. Owing to existing trouble between the Sallors' Union and

the Longshoremen's Union, Captain Pearce and been threatened with a boy cott by the sailors if he employed Ta coma longshoremen, and hence had

hired a crew at Seattle. When the steamer arrived in port about 200 longshoremen boarded her. armed with clubs, billies, pistols and other weapons. The Seattle men were beaten wherever found, and some 30 shots were fired before order was restored.

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
