Refusal to Take Back the Men Who Went Out in Sympathy Is Reiterated by Their Gen-

eral Agent.

CHICAGO, May 21 .- Sunday brought no change in the artitude of both mides of the labor controversy new in progress in Chicago, and everything tonight points toward an extension of the teamsters' strike to many other houses during the week. The express companies, whose refusal to reinstate any of the striking cm ployer caused the collapse of the settler ment of the trouble inst might, still wither to gheir determination not to give em-ployment to any of their former employer, and the firms involved in the difficulty doclared tonight that they would stand

by the express companies in the 6ght. The Transverse Union may taken just as firm a stand as the employees, and if was started by President Shen tonight that the union would never call off the strike until the express companies camp to

The first sprend of the strike is expected to come temptrow morning, when the Lumbermen's Association, an organization employing 2900 icamstens, issues an order to their men to make activeries to all business houses, regardless of whether they are involved in the strike or not. NAVAL FORCE TO BE MOBILE

Lord Esher Interprets the Speech of Premier Balfour.

LONDON, May 22,-Lord Esher, who was chairman of what is known as the Lord Esher Commission, appointed in 1960 for the purpose of advising the government concerning the creation of a board for the administrative business of the War Office, in a letter published in the Times this morning, says he infers that the general interpretation of Premier Balfour's recent speech on the defense of the empire is incorrect. Lord Eaber contends that the Premier's

argument, which was necessarily clothed in perliamentary and diplomatic language, was rather for an increase than a decrease of the naval and military power. Lord Esher argues that Mr. Balfour in-tended to convey the ides of the necessity of a naval force so large and mobile as to have sufficient force to protect the country from invasion, even when the main fleets are absent, and for an army strong enough to meet the future possi-bility of the Russian and Indian frontiers becoming co-terminous.
