CHAMBERLAIN TO

Governor Expects to Make Referendum Leading Issue in the Campaign.

WILL OPEN THE CONTEST

Whichever Side the Republicans Take on the Million-Dollar Appropriation Question, Democrats Expect to Profit.

SALEM, Or., May A1 - (Special)-The filing of the referendum petitions this week make it certain that appropriations, the form of appropriation bills and the maintenance of Normal Schools, will be prominent questions in the political campaign next Spring. The people will vote upon the appropriation bill at the same time that they vote upon candidates for state and county offices, and quite naturally the appropriation ques-tion will get mixed with the contest for

Candidates for seats in the Legislature, in particular, will be called upon to de-fine their positions regarding this bill, and appropriation bills in general. Mem-bers of the Legislature of 1995 who come up for re-election will be called upon to explain their votes on the appropriation bill that has met so much opposition. Governor Chamberlain's friends expect that the referendum fight will furnish him no small amount of political thunder, for it was his threat to veto the bill that induced the Legislature to leave off the emergency change and evice the der, for it was his throat to veto the bill that induced the Legislature to leave off the emergency clause and give the people a chance to vote upon the measure. It has been frequently remarked that Democrats. Socialists and former Populists have been the leaders in the referendum movement, and that the greater number of signers have been of these classes, so that the movement is locked upon as anti-Republican, though not entirely Democratic.

As a matter of fact, the Democrats are not in a position to pose as the exponents of the referendum on this measure, for when the bill was drawn and passed it was supported by the Democratic members who were interested in the passage of the Normal School appropriations which were saddled upon the appropriations for the asylum, penitentiary, etc.

Quite naturally Republican candidates for the Gubernatorial nomination will find it necessary to declare themselves upon public questions while they are seeking the support of Republicans in the primaries. Among other things they will be likely to tell what they think of appropriation bills.

Whether the people will pass the appropriation bill at the election in 1908 is a question that is receiving considerable discussion at present.
