TRUST OF RAILROADS Railway Franchise Amendment Would So Result.

SECOND STREET MATTER UP. It is Declared that the Portland Consolidated Had Forfeited Its Franchise There by Suspending Operations.

Adoption of the street railway franchise amendment next Monday would give to the Portland Consolidated Railway Company opportunity of completely monopolizing street-car traffic.

The blanket franchise of the City & Suburban Railway Company, which received the franchise to the street from the city, and which has since been merged into the Consolidated Company, provides that failure to maintain service for more than 30 days during any 90 consecutive days, the Common Council may, by ordinance, declare forfeited the franchise.

Cars have failed to run on Second street for a long time and it was learned from the City Auditor yesterday that the Consolidated Company had received no special permit from the City Council, authorizing the suspension of service.

Street railway companies of Portland are not taxed on the value of their franchise, but an effort will probably be made to secure a law to that end from the next Legislature.
