

GRAND JURY ACTS

Indictments Found Against Chicago Teamsters.

BRIbery CHARGE MAY FAIL

Evidence Too Slight to Justify Action-Conspiracy Charge Against Teamsters' Propose Arbitration.

CHICAGO, June 2.—Indictments connected with the teamsters' strike have been voted by a grand jury and will be returned in Judge Bernes' court tomorrow. The names of the men indicted could not be ascertained this afternoon.

Denies He Even Knew Shea.

Robert J. Thorne, general manager for Montgomery Ward & Co., was before the grand jury this afternoon, and, while denying absolutely all knowledge of the \$10,000 said to have been offered to Shea and other labor leaders, declared that he did not even know Shea at the time the alleged offer of \$10,000 was made.

Heavy Sea Helped Torpedoes to Sink Russian Ships.

LONDON, June 2.—The correspondent at Tokyo of the Daily Mail, cableing to his paper concerning the naval battle between the Japanese and Russian fleets, says: "Owing to the heavy sea in the earlier part of the engagement, the Russian hulls were disclosed below the water-line, presenting a good target, and enabling the Japanese guns to usurp the functions of torpedoes."

RUSSIA APPEALS TO FRANCE TO RELIEVE ANXIETY OF FAMILIES.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 2.—In order to relieve the suspense of thousands of families, Russia has appealed to France to secure through the French Minister at Tokyo the most complete list possible of the Russian officers and men who perished or were saved. The fate of hundreds probably never will be established. The Admiralty has practically given up all hope that the Russian protected cruisers Aurora and Oleg might limp into port.

Will Name Officers to Be Retired.

WASHINGTON, June 2.—A naval board consisting of Rear-Admirals Sledge, Davis, Thomas, Snow and Brownson, with Lieutenant-Commander Plunkett as recorder, has been appointed to designate those officers of the Navy who are to be retired under the personnel act. About 20, mostly commanders and lieutenant-commanders, have voluntarily applied for retirement. These will be retired, and in addition it will be necessary to retire compulsorily five Captains, four Commanders, four lieutenants-commanders and two lieutenants. Under the interpretation of the Personnel Act about 50 vacancies should be created under the personnel act, but as only 15 can be compulsorily retired, the number of volunteers has not been sufficient, the full number of vacancies cannot be created this year.

Trainload of Knights.

OMAHA, Neb., June 2.—(Special.)—A special train of nine Pullmans and two San Pedro diners bearing Knights of Columbus to the National convention at Columbus at Los Angeles, left OMAHA at noon today over the Union Pacific. The train brought over 140 Knights from New York and 40 more from Chicago.

SCUTARI IS LAID IN RUINS

One Hundred Killed, Nearly 300 Injured by Earthquake. CETTINE, June 2.—Later descriptions of the earthquake from Scutari, Albania, show that 100 persons were killed and 200 injured, and that the town has been completely devastated. There were 12 shocks. The inhabitants are now living in the open, while the foreign consuls have been provided with troops. The authorities have organized parties to search for the bodies of the victims.

DESTROYERS' DOUBLE DUEL

One Knocked Out on Each Side, Says Commander.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 2.—Lieutenant-General Linievitch has transmitted a report from General Kaabek, of the arrival of the torpedo-boat-destroyer Grosser at Vladivostok, and telling of a fight off Dagelet Island which vessel and the destroyer Redovi had with two Japanese destroyers. The Grosser and the Redovi sank as the result of an explosion. The report says that the Redovi was carrying Vice-Admiral Rojevstevsky and his staff.

PREPARES TO STRIKE AGAIN

Japan Will Send Expedition to Sakhalin, and Threatens Shanghai. LONDON, June 2.—According to dispatches from Shanghai, the Japanese are preparing an expedition for the island of Sakhalin, and have threatened to send a fleet to Shanghai to compel the observance of neutrality with regard to the Russian vessels there. This threat, the dispatches say, has induced the Russian Council to consent that the vessels be interned.

NO FRAGMENTS ARE AFLOAT

Japanese Ships Return From Search, Fate of the Jemchug.

TOKIO, June 2.—(10:30 P. M.)—Admiral Togo, telegraphing yesterday, says: "The ships sent northward to search for Russian vessels returned yesterday. The Japanese ships returned yesterday, but on both sides found no trace of the Russians."

DIRECT SNUB TO FRANCE

MOROCCO'S REJECTION OF PROPOSED REFORM SCHEME. France May Prevent Conference of Powers, but Kaiser Has Effectually Blocked Her Plans.

PARIS, June 2.—Although official confirmation is withheld, it is now generally accepted here that the report from Morocco had declined the French proposals for the reform of Morocco unless approved by an international conference was correct. This is widely commented on as amounting to a check to not a failure of the French mission sent to Fez, as well as a check to the entire French policy in Morocco.

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Sultan's Rejection of Reforms So Regarded—May Join Conference. LONDON, June 2.—The situation over Morocco is viewed with no little concern in diplomatic circles here. Indirectly the Sultan's refusal to accept the French proposals is regarded as a rebuff to Great Britain, but the Associated Press understands that, rather than risk further complications, France will be likely to join the other powers in a conference at Fez and Great Britain will follow suit.
