Forest Grove, Hillsboro and Cornelius Hold Joint Celebration.

The cities of Washington County were almost depopulated yesterday as nearly every man, woman and child who could possibly secure enough money to pay the railroad fare and purchase an admission ticket was in Portland, enjoying the sights of the Lewis and Clark Exposition. More than 2000 persons were conservatively estimated to have been in Portland from Washington County. Forest Grove and Hillsboro each furnished about 700, and the attendance from the other towns was just as large proportionately. It was the boast of the Forest Grove visitors that not a single business or professional man remained away from the Exposition yesterday.

Town Practically Deserted.

Hillsboro, Forest Grove and Cornelius, which are usually the scenes of business activity, were practically deserted the entire day until late at night, when the tired but enthusiastic sightseers returned home. The business houses were all closed, even including the saloons and restaurants. For days the residents of the Washington County towns had been waiting in eager anticipation the time when they would forget their cares and worries and attend the Exposition to show the people of Portland that they were determined to do their share in making the Western World's Fair an unprecedented success. Mass meetings were held, and the Mayors of the different cities issued proclamations urging the people to attend in full force.

The visitors from Washington County arrived in Portland yesterday morning on a Southern Pacific special train, which was crowded to its utmost capacity, hundreds having to stand. All were good-natured and cheerful, and although the train was uncomfortably crowded, no expressions of dissatisfaction were heard. From the windows of the train coaches were hung huge banners telling of the wonderful products raised in Washington County and of the inducements offered the homeseekers from the East who have been attracted to Portland because of the Exposition.

"Forest Grove has 2500 people, and its population has doubled in the last five years," and "Forest Grove has a milk condenser that pays out \$35,000 a month," were the types of banners brought on the train and carried to the Exposition grounds, where they were grouped along the columns in the Auditorium.

All Boost Their Towns.

The residents of the different towns all wore printed badges designating the towns from which they came. Besides wearing the badges, the Forest Grove people all had pinned to them carnations. In answer to questions, they courteously replied that Portland had gained so much notoriety over its being the "Rose City" that the Fair decided to make Forest Grove known to the world as the "Carnation City." Formalities and conventionalities were forgotten at the Exposition grounds, and those who wore the Washington County badges needed no introductions to each other. When they were not in raptures over the wonderful buildings and exhibits at the Fair, they were talking about Washington County and of the great benefits that would be derived from the Exposition.

Two Bands in Attendance.

The famous Ladies' Band and the Boys' Band, both of Hillsboro, were in attendance at the Exposition grounds yesterday, giving concerts at night. The Ladies' Band, which is known all over the West as being one of the most excellent musical organizations of its kind, is composed of 18 members, all of whom were in Portland yesterday. The Boys' Band consists of about 15 pieces. Forest Grove planned to have its band at the Exposition yesterday, but the director, who is also the station agent, was so busy selling tickets, that he did not have time to get the band together.

The Auditorium was crowded in the afternoon by the Washington County visitors, who held a mass meeting for the purpose of lauding the Exposition and the resources of their home county, and to thank the Lewis and Clark officials for the courtesies and attention that had been showered upon them. There was also a musical programme. The Administration Band furnished music. There were many outside people at the meeting, and it was to them that the speakers directed a good part of their addresses, urging them to visit the Washington County towns and see for themselves the inducements offered, both in business and social life. The enthusiasm was unrestrained and the speakers were interrupted again and again by bursts of applause. "God bless Oregon," came from the audience when the speakers told about the advantages of the greatest state in the Northwest.

Colonel Harry Haynes, of Forest Grove, presided as chairman and introduced the speakers. Jefferson Myers, president of the Oregon State Commission, was the first speaker to take the floor. He began by welcoming the visitors to Portland and the Exposition, and ended by

showing compliments upon Washington County and its inhabitants. He said that the Exposition a success and that the large and representative attendance of Washington County was a step in the right direction.

State Representative W. K. Newell was the next speaker, and in behalf of Washington County, he expressed gratitude and thanks to the Exposition management for the manner in which the visitors had been treated. Mr. Newell then proceeded to illustrate in words the almost unlimited advantages of Washington County. He told of the products, the climate, scenery, and his description was so vivid that he received considerable applause. "Why, when the Eastern people see our cherries they think they are plums because of their size," was one of the expressions of Mr. Newell.

Mayor Benjamin Cornelius, of Hillsboro, followed Mr. Newell, and he devoted most of his speech to the city in which he lived. "I am an Oregon product, and I am proud of it," said the Mayor. "I was born in Washington County 34 years ago and they haven't driven me away yet. You can get both soft and hard drinks in Hillsboro, and you don't have to hunt around for a 'blind pig'." Incidentally remarked Mayor Cornelius in explaining why Hillsboro was the "only" town in Oregon. He also stated that there were less rented houses in Hillsboro, according to size, than any other city in the state.

"You people came down to Portland to see the Exposition, and not to hear me speak," said W. K. Newell, who was the first to speak. He then turned to the beginning of a short but very effective speech. His address was mostly about Lewis and Clark and pioneers who followed upon their footsteps. He pointed out the sun above for the first time this morning in five days and attributed it to the presence of the splendid representation from Washington County. He said President H. W. Goode, who was the next in line. He extended to the visitors a hearty welcome and closed by stating that he hoped they would return to their homes with only fond remembrances of their visit to Portland, and that he would see their faces many times again at the Fair.

Judge W. H. Hollis spoke on "Forest Grove, Its Location and Resources," and his address was well received. He said that Forest Grove was surrounded by the richest and most productive farming land, but that thousands of acres still remained untouched by the hand of man farther than the leveling of the immense forests. He also said that the Willamette Valley

was the garden spot of the Northwest. "Back in Illinois they called us suckers, but they did not call me a sucker when I settled in Forest Grove," said Professor J. B. Robertson, of the Pacific University. "When you hear of Portland, Seattle and San Francisco you are reminded of rumbling trucks, the clanging of bells and all that is noisy and lively. But when you hear of Lake Park and Forest Grove you think of the lofty trees, the beautiful and cozy homes of contented people. Forest Grove offers every advantage for a home. The people are progressive and public spirited and the moral sentiment is strong."

W. H. March, of Cornelius, was the last of the speakers. He made the prediction that as Forest Grove and Hillsboro were only six miles apart and Cornelius was between them, that his city would some day be the main business district. He said the three cities would expand until they were all united. He talked as though it would happen within four or five years.

Gives Reading in Auditorium.

To a rather small but very appreciative and interested audience, Miss Maude Battelle Hammill, of Idaho, made her first appearance in Portland last night in the Auditorium at the Exposition grounds. Miss Hammill gave a splendid recitation of "The Confessional," a love story relating to the treachery of a Venetian nobleman to a young, innocent girl whom he met on a pleasure trip. Miss Hammill was really superb in the reading, and all those who saw her last night predict that she has a successful and glorious future in store for her. Her pronunciation is excellent and her expressions and gestures are those of a finished actress who has had the experience and training of years. The audience last night was delighted over her recitation, and after continued applause she was persuaded to appear for the second time. When she concluded, upon urgent request she ascended to the hall of the Auditorium, where she was introduced to the many admirers she made last night. Miss Hammill appeared under the auspices of the Pennsylvania Society.

WARSHIPS FOR FAIR

Three Cruisers Will Arrive at Portland.

OFFICERS WILL BE FETED

All of the Men of the Cruisers Boston, Chicago and Maclabhead Will Be Granted Free Admission to Exposition.

Early this afternoon Portland harbor will be invaded by three cruisers of the Pacific squadron, unless some unforeseen delay occurs. The vessels are the cruisers Boston, Chicago and Maclabhead, in personal command of Rear-Admiral Goodrich. Immediately upon their arrival in the harbor the boats will open fire—but it will be a fusillade of peace and good will in the form of a salute to the Lewis and Clark Exposition, on account of which the fighting craft have been ordered here. Elaborate receptions are being made for the entertainment of Rear-Admiral Goodrich and his fellow officers and crews. Much of the entertainment will be undertaken by attaches of the Exposition. The flotilla is due at the mouth of the Columbia at dawn and the trip to Portland should be completed by 2 o'clock. Anchors will be dropped near the Steel Bridge. A reception committee from the Exposition will be taken aboard the flagship immediately upon the dropping of anchor. This committee, composed of President H. W. Goode, Vice-President I. N. Fleischer, W. D. Panton, J. C. Almsworth, T. B. Wilcox and L. A.

Lewis, will extend the Admiral and his officers and men a hearty welcome to the Portland Exposition. A reception in honor of the officers will be arranged for later.

During their stay in Portland the officers will be extended the privileges of the Exposition; the enlisted men will be supplied with free admission tickets and everything possible done to make their stay in port a pleasant one.

The decks of the three boats will add an element of interest to the Exposition during their stay, the exact length of which has not yet been announced. The vessels at anchor will be in plain view of the Fair grounds and visitors will be allowed aboard during a set period each day.

AT THE WASHINGTON BUILDING

Informal Reception Will Be Held With Musical Programme.

Mrs. Olive M. Leonard, Bellingham's official hostess of the Washington ladies yesterday, extends a cordial invitation to every club woman in the city to attend an informal reception and musical at the Washington building, Thursday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. Friday there will also be open house at the Washington building all day, the occasion being Industrial Day. Members of all industrial bodies in the city are especially invited to this occasion, and ladies are also asked to come, as there will be another musical programme and refreshments. The Whittom booth will be dedicated on this day, and it is probable that Vice-President I. N. Fleischer will make the address. E. E. White of Bellingham will make the dedicatory speech, and Commissioner Elmer Johnston will welcome the guests.

Hundreds of beautiful souvenirs were distributed by the Bellingham ladies yesterday, and will be given away throughout the week. Many ideas pertaining to the industries of Bellingham are carried out in these souvenirs, which are decidedly unique.

FLAG DAY AT THE FAIR.

June 14 Is Set Apart for a Patriotic Demonstration.

June 14 at the Lewis and Clark Exposition will be devoted to the Daughters of the American Revolution as "Flag Day," and upon this occasion a human flag, to be composed entirely of pupils from the different city schools, will be portrayed in baseball park.

The three colors composing the body of the flag will be represented by 35 girls, while 30 boys will form the staff. Robert Krohn, in charge of physical training in the public schools, and physical instructor of the Multnomah Club, has had the children under his personal supervision for some time, and reports that everything is now in complete readiness for the event, which he describes as being on the most gorgeous scale of anything of the kind ever heretofore portrayed. It will be a repetition of the flag that was exhibited when President Roosevelt was here two years ago, and which elicited so much praise from the chief executive, only there will be many more elaborate features, and in fact, it will be a decided improvement in every way upon that idea.

The pupils comprising the flag have been selected from the following schools: Couch, Chapman, Davis, Atkinson, Ladd, Shattuck and Felling, of the West Side, and Clinton Kelly, Brooklyn, Burnside, Hawthorne, North Central, Holladay, Williams Avenue, D. P. Thompson and Woodlawn, of the East Side.

GOOD CROWD AT FAIR

Sunny Weather Takes Many to Exposition Grounds.

TWO CONCERTS ARE GIVEN

Trail Is Alive With Visitors and the Biggest Attendance Since Opening Day Is Recorded for the Centennial.

ADMISSIONS 10,382.

As near as could be estimated last night the total admissions of yesterday were 10,382. The masses to the Exposition grounds are decreasing as the Fair nears completion, and the paid admissions are on the increase.

Taking advantage of the sun, which peeped out from behind the folds of black clouds for a few hours, more persons visited the Exposition yesterday than since June 1. The sun, which had been opened to the world, early in the morning the clouds showed a slight tendency to break and the Exposition officials felt elated as they were sure that if they had favorable weather, the attendance would pick up immediately.

In the afternoon the sun, which had been struggling in the thick enveloping clouds all day, discovered a breach and for several hours shone brightly. The effect was instantaneous, as immediately thereafter the street-cars leading to the Exposition grounds were crowded with visitors. The sun remained out long enough to attract more visitors to the grounds than on any of the five preceding days. The Exposition was at its best yesterday. There was a slight breeze blowing sufficient to arouse the rain-battered flags to come to life. The grounds were comfortably filled. Innes' band, which gave two concerts yesterday, one in the afternoon and one at night, attracted the largest local point, the heavy space in the immediate vicinity of the stand being all taken up.

The Trail was the scene of gayety last night, the "Parkers," who have been sitting in the buildings, coming forth once more with renewed vigor. The Trail was crowded nearly all day and the concessions, with very few exceptions, did a good business. The crowds remained late last night and at 11:30 o'clock, when the guards started to clear the grounds, they were quite a few on the Trail.

Notwithstanding the light attendance, the Exposition officials are not discouraged in the least and are confident that with the arrival of clear weather the admissions will greatly increase. The cloudy weather has been general over the Pacific Coast and the residents of the neighboring states, who are contemplating a visit to the Exposition, have been dissuaded. Up to the present most of the visitors to the Exposition have been from Portland and local points, the heavy Eastern and Southern travel having not begun yet.

The exercises will be held in the Oregon state building at 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon.

RAILWAY MEN ARE THE GUESTS

Transcontinental Passenger Association Delegates at the Fair.

ARE GIVEN A LUNCHEON

President Goode Extends a Hearty Welcome to the Visitors, and Several Make Speeches, Expressing Good Will.

The members of the Transcontinental Passenger Association were the guests of the Lewis and Clark Exposition yesterday. Arriving at the grounds shortly after noon they were given a luncheon in the New York building, which was followed by visits to the different portions of the Exposition.

The luncheon in the New York building proved an unusually pleasant occasion, at which attaches of the Exposition were able to present formally their thanks for the co-operation in the matter of rates which they have received through the Association. Informal addresses were made by President Goode, Vice-President I. N. Fleischer, James Charlton, Chairman of the Association; W. D. Wheelwright, President of the Chamber of Commerce; Charles S. Fee, Passenger Traffic Manager of the Southern Pacific Company, and C. E. Stone. The affair was attended by all the visiting members of the Association, with their wives and daughters, and by a large delegation of Exposition officials. At the conclusion of the luncheon they were extended a hearty welcome by President Goode, on behalf of the Exposition. Mr. Goode expressed his appreciation of the good work in the interest of Portland's great Fair, that had been performed by the visitors. "The burden of exploitation of this Fair has been greatly lightened by you," concluded Mr. Goode, "and it is impossible to say how much we appreciate what you have done for us."

Retrospection by Mr. Charlton.

Chairman James Charlton responded. He recalled a former visit to Portland, when there were no bridges and no East Portland, and when he saw all the city in one hour. Even then he saw great things in store for Portland, he asserted, but it had never occurred to him that Portland would some day have a great World's Fair like the one he now found spread out before him. Mr. Charlton concluded with a brief review of the city's progress and predicted an even greater future.

Mr. Fleischer, acting for Mr. Goode, who was called to the exercises in the Auditorium, next introduced Mr. Wheelwright, who was greeted with applause. The speaker said he might reasonably be expected to proceed with a commercial speech, but that out of consideration for the feelings of the guests of honor he would refrain from saying good things about Portland that were only too apparent. He concluded with a reference to what he termed the great debt of gratitude owed the visitors by the city and by the Exposition, for their efforts in behalf of the Fair.

Attitude of California.

Mr. Fee, who was next presented, said he had known the Pacific Northwest for the past 15 years and liked it more the longer he knew it. He reviewed briefly the hardships of the explorers Lewis and Clark and extended his congratulations to the Exposition management of the great Exposition that now marks the exploits of the great explorers. Referring to California, he gave assurance that the people of that state were co-workers in the Exposition cause.

"I know California is with you heart and soul," said Mr. Fee. "You may expect a large attendance from there. Interest is widespread and the people seem to feel that the success of the Lewis and Clark Exposition is a matter of personal interest to them. You have no more hearty or more sincere friends anywhere. And in conclusion I wish to congratulate you on having an Exposition that is more nearly completed than any that has ever been my pleasure to attend during the past ten years."

Mr. Stone, the last speaker, paid a brief tribute to the local railroad men and the work they have done in the interest of the Fair. The party was then escorted about the grounds, many of them remaining for the Innes band concert.
