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TRAIN JUMPS INTO RAVINE

Confederate Veteran Excursion Suffers Disaster With Three Deaths.

ALBION, Ill., June 13.—Three persons were killed and 25 injured in the wreck of a train on the Illinois Central Southern Railroad at Golden Gate, Ill., today. The train was a "Cotton special" carrying Confederate veterans to the reunion at Louisville, Ky. Panama Vessels Exempted

Custom-house officials have received the following order from E. T. Chamberlain, of the Department of Commerce and Labor, in the form of a proclamation by the President:

"The foreign discriminating duties of tonnage and imports within the United States are suspended and discontinued so far as respects the vessels of the Republic of Panama, and the produce, manufactures and merchandise imported into the United States from any other country, the vessel to take effect on and after the date of this proclamation and to continue so long as the reciprocal exemption of vessels belonging to citizens of the United States and their cargoes shall be continued and no longer."
