MAY NOT BE McCANDLISH.—The identity of the man who committed suicide at the Everett House Monday night is still in doubt. He was at first believed to be McCandlish of Seattle and Earl M. Creek, Alaska, and W. Steelworth, who has "mashed" on the "inside" of Alaska with McCandlish believes he is the suicide, though the statement caused by the bullet wounds makes recognition difficult. George Meyers, the to-be-accused, who also knew McCandlish in Alaska, says it is not he, but another argonaut, Mike King, by name. To settle the identity Coroner Finley has written to George Phelan, of Seattle, to come down and examine the remains. Phelan is a brother-in-law of McCandlish.

SELLWOOD WILL GET WOOLLEN MILL.—T. W. Clark, who has been negotiating with the Clifford Bros., of North Dakota, announced yesterday that they had concluded to move their big woolen mill plant to Portland, and that work on the establishment would begin at Sellwood in a short time. Local capitalists have taken \$25,000 of the stock of the concern. E. L. Thompson, a local capitalist, also interested himself in the enterprise and helped place some of the stock. The plant will be located on the former site of the Portland Woolen Mills Company at Sellwood, on Johnson Creek, where there is water for washing wool and for power part of the year.

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REV. JEROME McGLADE IS DOCTOR OF DIVINITY.—Rev. Jerome McGlade, pastor of the Mizpah Presbyterian Church, is now entitled to have "D. D." written after his name. He returned last evening from the East, where he attended the general conference of the Presbyterian Church. He was present at the banquet and commencement of the college at Hopkinton, Ia., from which he graduated 21 years ago. The college conferred on Mr. McGlade the degree of doctor of divinity. Mr. McGlade was one of the speakers at the alumni banquet the evening before commencement.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETS.—The annual meeting of the board of directors of the Hotel Portland was held last night and Harry L. Corbett was elected a member of the board in the place of John C. Alingworth. This was the only change in the personnel of the hotel since the business meeting was a brief one. A report was read giving in detail the amount of money spent in improvements on the hotel. The treasurer's report showed the company to be in a healthy financial condition.

HOME TRAINING ASSOCIATION.—At the regular meeting of the Home Training Association, which will take place this afternoon in the parlors of the Young Women's Christian Association, Dr. J. Whitcomb Reuther will talk on the topic of "The Mother as an Educator." The meeting will be at 2 o'clock, and after the programme there will be the annual election of officers. A nursery is provided for children who may accompany parents.

DETECTIVE ASSAULT.—Frank F. Lischke, employed as a detective by the Lewis and Clark Exposition secret service agency, was arrested by Bailiff Goltz of the Municipal Court yesterday, on a warrant sworn to before Judge Hogue. The defendant's sister-in-law is the complainant, and charges assault and battery. The case will be called before Judge Hogue this morning.

COUNCIL IN ACTION

New Mayor and Councilmen Attend the Meeting.

SESSION IS A QUIET ONE

Merrill Introduces Ordinance Allowing Saloons to Keep Open All Night Upon Payment of Higher License to City.

Dr. Harry Lane, the Mayor-elect, occupied a seat by the side of Mayor Williams at yesterday afternoon's session of the City Council, while all the newly-elected Councilmen sat alongside the members whose places they are so soon to fill. Sharkey was the only one of the old board who did not have some one standing around with his eyes ready to take his place, and the man with the perennial smile from the eighth Ward seemed to appreciate every phase of the situation in this respect.

Everybody was on his good behavior, too, and the proceedings went through as if it were the occasion. The only ripple of excitement to disturb the serenity of things was when City Auditor Devlin read an ordinance providing for the keeping open of saloons between 1 and 5 A. M., upon payment of an \$400 license. Its authorship was ascribed to Sharkey, but the allegation brought that astute statesman to his feet in a hurry.

"If Your Honor please," said he, addressing the Mayor, "I am not the father of that ordinance."

The paternity of the measure was about to pass into unwritten history, when Merrill Alexander, blushing admitted that he did it, and sought to make amends by moving that it be referred to the liquor license committee, which was done.

J. E. P. Copeland, who was alleged to have been employed by City Treasurer Weirlein as a deputy contrary to the municipal civil service rules, was allowed \$100 on account of seven months' salary.

The following ordinances were passed:

Transferring \$72,500 from the water fund to the water board interest fund for the payment of interest due on water bonds July 1, 1905.

Authorizing the payment of \$500 to provide for the payment of damages to buildings owned by Frank Robertson in the repair of the Tanner-Creek sewer.

Amending the cost of street improvements as follows: Water street, from the south line of Hawthorne avenue to the north line of East Oak street at \$4605.31.

Twenty-second street from the north line of Washington street to the south line of Sawyer street at \$1445.54.

Jackson street, from the west line of blocks 48 and 49, Carter's Addition, to the east line of Nineteenth street, at \$677.51.

Hawthorne avenue, from 12 feet west of the east line of East Third street to the east line of East Eleventh street, at \$2077.26.

Buckley avenue, from the north line of East Stark street to the north line of Mayor Gates' Addition, at \$4159.49.

Fargo street, from the east line of Gantenbein avenue to the east line of Commercial street, at \$171.51.

Burnside street, from the east line of Front street to the east line of Third street, at \$7449.68.

Assessing the cost of improving the east line of East Thirty-fourth street to the west line of East Thirty-fifth street, at \$195.82.

Street Improvements.
 Providing for the time and manner of improving the following streets: West Park street, between the north line of Yamhill to the south line of Couch's Addition, at an estimated cost of \$1130.

Morris street, from the west curb line of Delia street to the east line of Vancouver avenue, at an estimated cost of \$240.

Ninth street, from the south line of Couch's Addition to the north line of Hoyt street, at an estimated cost of \$2552.

East Twenty-seventh street, from the north line of Hawthorne avenue to the south line of East Union street, at an estimated cost of \$500.

East Stark street, from the east line of East Ninth street to the west line of East Twentieth street, at an estimated cost of \$1377.

Eighteenth street, from the north line of Marshall to the south line of Vaughn streets at an estimated cost of \$10,308.

East Stark street, from the center line of East Ninth street to the east line of East Ninth street, at an estimated cost of \$125.

Twenty-fifth street, from the north line of Sawyer street to the north line of Vaughn street, at an estimated cost of \$2130.

To change and establish the grade of the following streets: Hawthorne avenue, at East Twenty-eighth street and Preston avenue; Schuyler street, at East Twenty-ninth and East Thirty-first streets; East Alder street, at a point 300 feet west of the west line of East Thirty-second street; Bladmore street, from Cleveland avenue to Garfield avenue.

Authorizing the license committee to issue permits to dispose of information books or guides.

Authorizing the City Engineer to employ an additional surveyor at \$125 a month; one transit man at \$75 a month, and two chainmen at \$45 a month each for a period of three and one-half months from June 15.

Fixing the rates of license for persons engaged in the business of manufacturing, and publishers.

Repealing ordinance No. 14,388, providing for the construction of a sewer on Pettigrove street from the west line of Twenty-sixth to the sewer in Pettigrove street, at Twenty-fourth.

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FINISH THE COURSE

Young Men Graduate From Columbia University.

FIRST FRUITS OF SCHOOL

Institution Turns Out Class of High Standing at the Close of the First Four Years of Its Existence.

Founded four years ago, the Columbia University, in University Park, yesterday graduated its first class in the Academic department, the graduates and winners of gold and silver medals receiving their diplomas and medals direct from Archbishop Alexander Christie, D. D., founder of the college. The hall was filled with friends of the institution, and the archbishop came with many of the Catholic clergy of Portland and the Northwest.

President M. A. Quinlan and the faculty were in charge. An overture by the S. R. A. orchestra opened the exercises. Robert E. Simmitt, a Portland attorney, delivered the address, which was filled with admonitions to the class, the keynote being "Work." Le Roy Wood read the class poem. Charles Roe gave a solo, when Ignatius McNamara delivered the valedictory address. After a selection by the college quartet, Archbishop Christie delivered the charge to the class. Among other things he said:

"Four years ago when I took this ground and building for the purpose of founding an institution of learning for our young men, I received no encouragement. On the other hand, I was informed that the effort would fail, as others had failed, but thanks to the aid of some worthy citizens, it has not failed, and today sends forth the first class of young men. I have these devoted fathers, the faculty and the congregation of the Holy Cross, under whose charge the college passed, to thank for the first fruits of our work, and we pledge our future support to make it a great institution. Young gentlemen, as you go forth from Columbia College, its first graduates, let me say we shall watch your course, and if you honor this institution in your lives we shall be glad that we founded the college. Remember to be temperate. The time is passed when business men will tolerate a drinking man. Be honest and upright and true Catholic citizens, and associate with those who will encourage you in that kind of life; and then we shall not regret that we have bestowed these first honors upon you."
