ALARMING REPORTS POUR IN

Russia Appears to Be a Bolling Cauldron of Discontent.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 27.-(3:35 P. M.) -These are gloomy days for the govern-ment of Russia. Every new dispatch accentuates the seriousness of the situ-action in Poland and the Caucasus, where a state of almost open war exists, and re-city and by red flag demonstrations. a state of almost open war exists, and reports of strikes, demonstrations and agrarian disorders are pouring in from many purts of Russia, as if the volleys fired at Lodge had been the signal for an outbreak of general disorders like those following the events of January 22 "Red Sunday."

Up to the present St. Petersburg and Moscow have not been affected, but if mobilization is to be attempted in the two capitals, as reported, a recrudescence of former tamults is likely to DOCUE.
